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The Proposed Celebration.

The citizens have made a good start towards the second grand mid-summer carnival. Last year's event, generally known as the Coronation Celebration, was such a success from every standpoint that the men who carried it to a successful conclusion determined upon a similar event this year, only upon a grander scale.

There can be no doubt but that considerable good will be derived by the town and county. In the first place, the carnival will attract hundreds of visitors from all parts of the province, who will have the opportunity in many cases to visit their old home at reduced rates, and thereby the Celebration will partake somewhat of the character of an Old Home week, so popular across the line and in the Upper Provinces. Again, the immense crowds will leave considerable money in the hands of the merchants, livermen, hotelkeepers and in fact almost every class will benefit in a greater or less degree.

The only drawback is that a few consider the Exhibition may suffer somewhat by reason of the show being only a month later than the Carnival. We doubt very much that any such trouble will occur. The people who come from outside places will not usually be found at our Exhibition, and besides, the promoters of the Carnival are willing and prepared to do their utmost to make the Exhibition a success as well. Everyone should throw off his coat and work for the success of both. That such will be the case no one doubts.

Amendments to the Criminal Code.

The minister of justice has introduced a bill embodying some important changes in the criminal law. One section provides that no employer shall, under the penalty of a heavy fine, discriminate against any person in his service, on account of said employee being a member of the militia force, and also making it an offence to attempt to deter anyone from joining the force.

Another matter for serious concern is the amendment making the sale or gift of tobacco in any form to minors under 18 years an offence punishable by a fine of from \$10 to \$50 and 30 days imprisonment. This section is no doubt a compromise to partially meet the views of those who wished to prohibit the cigarette as evidenced by the Bickerdike bill, which however, was stranded by reason of a technicality.

THE POPE.

A few years ago it was customary to speak of Pope Leo, Bismark and Gladstone as "the three grand old men." Before this paper is read the last of these may have passed away. In some respects the world has already modified its judgment of the other two. But whatever place Pope Leo XIII. may take in history as a statesman and a pontiff, he will always be admired for his great intellectual gifts and accomplishments, and for a long time to come will be remembered for his personal graces, the rare charm of his manner, and the kindly relations which he has maintained with nations and people of other faiths.

The sovereign pontiff has attained the great age of 83, and although a vigorous man for his years, he has lately been under the constant care of his physicians. Senile pneumonia has developed, and the end is thought to be very near.

THE TOWN FINANCES.

Some outside papers, particularly the *Courier*, have been holding up our town finances as a horrible example of bad management. True there is a very large bank deficit, much larger than the law allows, yet we do not know that any definite financial statement has ever been presented showing just what the condition of affairs may be.

Some time ago when the council was under fire one member stated that the board should be in a position at any time to furnish a complete statement of the town's indebtedness. We submit the absolute necessity for such at the present time and trust the board may without delay inform the public of the true condition of affairs.

Much of Queen Draga's unpopularity, it is said, arose from the fact that she brought order into the household.

Some Political Rumors.

There is a persistent rumor in circulation that Hon. George H. Murray, premier of Nova Scotia, will retire from local politics at an early date and seek election to the House of Commons in the liberal interest from the United Counties of Victoria and Cape Breton.

Hon. Mr. Murray is an aggressive politician, personally popular, and would make a strong addition to the debating talent at Ottawa. As premier of his native province he finds himself at the head of a party in the assembly comprising 36 out of 38 representatives. In the event of his abandoning the premiership, Hon. J. W. Longley would in all probability succeed to the leadership.

Death of Hon. H. T. Duffy.

The province of Quebec lost one of its ablest and most respected public men last week in the person of Hon. H. Thomas Duffy, provincial treasurer. The deceased expired suddenly in the rotunda of the Chateau Frontenac, Quebec. He had been for about ten years a member of the Legislature, and in the Parent government represented the Eastern Townships. His administration of the finances was highly successful in that a surplus was shown each year, something unusual in that province. It is thought that Hon. W. A. Weir, member for Argenteuil will be called to the Cabinet in his stead.

THE DIOCESAN SYNOD.

The Episcopal people have been entertaining the members of the Synod this week. It is nine years since it met here before. It convened on Tuesday morning. At eight o'clock Holy Communion was celebrated in St. Luke's church. A large number participated in the ceremony.

The opening session of the Synod began at 10 o'clock in the school-room of the church. Bishop Kingdon presided, and Canon O S Newnham officiated as secretary.

Bishop Kingdon delivered his address. He spoke of the previous session nine years ago in Woodstock, and of the pleasure then experienced, but of the sadness now at the absence of the late Mr W F Dibblee. Bishop Kingdon then feelingly referred to the death of Revs George Schofield, W S Covert and Henry Morris during the past year. He characterized them as clergymen much respected by all and as having done excellent work for Christ and the church. His Lordship deeply deplored the loss sustained by this diocese by the death of these clergymen. He then spoke of the action of the General Synod in creating a general mission fund by which Canadian Churchmen are to raise \$75,000. The assessment on this diocese is to be \$3,000. This amount must be outside of the regular church funds. Canons X and XI, dealing somewhat with this matter, cannot be taken into account at the present time, however, said Bishop Kingdon. He urged on the Synod to endeavor to increase contributions to missionary funds, as missionary efforts were the life of the church. Dealing with the action of the General Synod in regard to the use of the Revised Version in the Episcopal Church, the General Synod permits the use of this version, but said His Lordship, this diocese is bound by canon to adhere to the authorized version. He stated that he approved of the edition of the revised version as used in American Episcopacy. Proceeding, he spoke of the standing committee on Sunday school work, and of the committee as enlarged three years ago as doing but mediocre work. Only seven members of the committee attended the committee meetings. He suggested that the Synod ratify the appointment of Rev Henry Montgomery as permanent secretary of this work, which he characterized as a most important one. A plan has been suggested of examining Sunday school teachers and granting certificates on completion of course. Bishop Kingdon recommended the appointment of a committee to deal with such matters. He did not think it possible to inaugurate a normal school, but thought great efforts should be put forth in this line. He regretted the decrease of 201 teachers and 1,168 scholars last year. He urged on the Synod to carefully consider the motion in regard to biennial sessions, which comes up in this session. With deep regret he announced the resignation of Registrar C E A Simonds, an efficient officer. In succession he nominated Rev T W Street. He then announced that this fall the fiftieth anniversary of the consecration of the Cathedral at Fredericton would be celebrated, when His Lordship Bishop Courtney would preach. All the clergy and laity are cordially invited to be present. The Bishop's address was closed with a well-worded exhortation to diligent work and effort.

CM Sherwood, Centreville, is again open to receive applications for Electric light, for three or four more houses only. This is as much as the present motor wheel will carry. Cost, about two-thirds of one cent per night, per 16 c p lamp, and more than full measure in voltage—all that the lamps will safely stand without shortening their lives too much. This is a matter frequently neglected by unscrupulous Electricians, where they are not regulated by law. The saving of fire insurance, or the extra safety of lighting by this method, is alone worth all the light costs at the above figures, for light at these figures is a little short of a gift. Early applicants may have the light free until 15th Sept. next. The many advantages of "Counterweight" lamps should not be overlooked.

A SITE PURCHASED.

Mr A. Wilnot Hay, president of the Meductic Meat Co, went to Halifax on Monday to confer with the management of the People's Bank in regard to the purchase of the old Moore's Mill site for his industry.

We learn that a bargain has been made and Mr Hay expects to proceed with the removal of his factory at an early date. The Town Board of Health at a special meeting held on Monday afternoon granted Mr Hay permission to slaughter hogs within the town limits. The citizens voted heavily in favor of the bonus last Friday, so there is evidently a perfectly free hand for the company.

Victoria County Council.

The semi-annual session of the Municipality of Victoria opened in the Court House, Tuesday morning, at 10 o'clock. Warden Ryan was in the chair, and the following councillors present:—

The minutes of last meeting were read by Sec.-Treas Tibbits and approved.

On motion Coun Baxter, seconded Coun Brymer, resolutions of regret at the death of James Watts, for over 30 years official reporter of the council, were passed by a standing vote.

The morning session was chiefly devoted to the question of the disposal of by-road money whether the local government representatives would be willing to allow the council to expend the same, provided the law was changed. Coun Tweeddale, who is also a government member, in his reply, stated that the former local representatives had over drawn the by-road money by \$2300, consequently it was doubtful if any money could be secured for this year.

A dispute about the ferry at Salmon river, and petitions for the establishment of other ferries, occupied the greater part of the afternoon session.

The usual petitions, claiming over assessment, were disposed of.

A committee of six councillors was appointed to examine the accounts.

On Wednesday morning a delegation of the ladies of Perth was present. They presented a petition asking that the council appoint a committee of three to meet with the liquor license commissioners and urge that no licenses be granted in Perth. The following committee was appointed; Baxter, Brymer and Howlett.

Sec.-Treas Tibbits reported showing an expenditure of \$4473.75; receipts including balance on hand, \$3880.82; balance due Sec.-Treas., \$792.93; very little of this year's assessment has been collected as yet.

On Wednesday afternoon, on invitation, W W Hubbard, agricultural agent C.P.R., addressed the board.

C. D. Dickinson Injured in New York.

New York, July 7—Charles D. Dickinson, the Woodstock (N.B.) broker, who fell in the post office here Sunday, was transferred from the Hudson Street Hospital to Bellevue Hospital this afternoon, has recovered consciousness, but is still liable to serious results though not likely dangerous. His skull is not fractured, but the injury to the ear and temple may cause inflammation of the brain. Hospital Surgeon Marshall would give no prophecy as to when Dickinson might recover, or if he would ever recover entirely.

An Independent Vote.

It is not easy for a member of Parliament to break away from his party, especially on a motion brought forward by the party leader, and Mr. McGowan and Mr. Calvin both deserve great credit for taking an independent stand and voting against Mr. Borden's motion to increase the duties on iron and steel. The vote which they gave will not be forgotten by the farmers of Centre Wellington and Frontenac.

Reports from the west of Ireland, Lancashire and other points, state that thousands of acres of potatoes have been destroyed by the recent frost and rain. It is feared that the Irish potato crop will entail much hardship on the peasants.
