## RUSSIA AND MANCHURIA.

Russia continues to disavow having any designs, sinister or otherwise, upon Manchuria, but, as the correspondent of a contemporary here rightly observes, it is difficult to find any one in Britain who places the smallest value upon these disavowals. To all intents and purposes Manchuria is now under Russian control, and it is because the time is approaching when Russia agreed to give that up that the present trouble has arisen. Instead of evacuating Manchuria, as agreed upon, Russia wants to make its grip upon the province still tighter, and, if possible, with the semblance of sanction from China. At the instigation of Britain that China has as yet refused, but probably Russia will resolve just to do without it, and carry out its intentions despite all protests. No one appears to doubt that Russia will ultimately exclude all foreign trade from Manchuria. The only question is when and by what stages this will be accomplished. If Britain cannot secure an 'open door' in Manchuria for herself and all other nations, it is vain for the Government at Washington to think that it will obtain it for this country alone—a selfish policy which Britain would never pursue.—S. A. Journal.

## The Silent City of Alaska.

Many stories have been written about mirages and delusions, but none has been more interesting and curious than that of the Silent City mirage which makes its appearance near the Pacific glacier in Alaska. The discovery of this wonderful mirage was made by the Indians, who would tell of the city which was built in the clouds. The mirage can be seen in the early part of July from 5 to 6 p. m. It rises from the side of the Pacific glacier. It first appears like a heavy mist and soon becomes clearer, and one can distinctly see the spectro city, well defined streets and trees, tall spires and huge and odd shaped buildings which appear to be ancient mosques or cathedrals. It is a city which would seem to contain at least 25,000 or 30,000 inhabitants. As yet no one has been able to identify it, although several have claimed to recognize the place. There is no city like it in Alaska nor in any country about it for thousands of miles. Some claim it is a city in Russia, others say it is a city in England, but none can tell where and what it is. The mirage was given the name of Silent City, as it appears to one like a dead city. There is nothing that would indicate that it is inhabited.

Ottawa, May 4.—Superintendent of Immigration, A. D. Scott, has been notified by the immigration officials in the west, that the Doukhobor band, which started out on the march on Saturday, has been disbanded, and that the three leaders are at Saskatoon, where they are being looked after. It is not expected that there will be any further trouble.

## THE TASK COMPLETED.

The revision and consolidation of the statutes of New Brunswick, involving an enormous amount of labor, has been completed by the commissioners, Hon. A. S. White, Mr. F. B. Carvell, ex-M. P. P., and Mr. R. A. Lawlor. The work makes two large printed volumes with a total of some 3,000 pages, and represents the labor of those bright lawyers for a couple of years. Mr. White did the largest amount of the labor, but was ably assisted by his confreres, and all three gentlemen have given the most painstaking attention to their responsible duties.

The consolidation of the statutes was a work urgently demanded by all who have to do with the administration of the law, and the government were fortunate indeed in securing services of able lawyers for the important duty.

The legislature has adopted the revision, the amendments made during the session will be incorporated in the volumes already printed, and the new volumes will be ready for issue in a few weeks.—Exchange.

The United States can show a remarkable variety in climate as well as in resources. While the 29th of April was, in New York, the warmest day of the season in seven years, out in Wisconsin, South Dakota, and Kansas something like a mid-winter blizzard was prevailing at the same time.

King Edward in France.

King Edward was the recipient of a cordial reception in Paris, when he visited that city last week. He was greeted by President Loubet, the band of the Garde Republic played 'God Save the King,' and the greetings of the people along the route were cordial at all times and at times enthusiastic.

While King Edward was in France, a magnificent military review took place in his honor, 14,000 picked French troops being in line. As the King's equipage entered the field of manoeuvres, batteries of field guns made the air tremble with their thundering salutes, while fanfares of trumpets were sounded, standards were dipped, and the bands played 'God Save the King.' As the climax of the review, the cavalry brigade charged at breakneck speed, in a straight line, towards where the King stood, and came to an abrupt halt in an unbroken column immediately in front of the review stand.

SUICIDE IS NOW EPIDEMIC.

With the return of spring the increase in the number of suicides in the United Kingdom, is again apparent. Recently there has been an epidemic of self-destruction. In the first seventeen days of April, no fewer than forty suicides have been committed in England, Wales, and Scotland. Of this number seven people ended their lives with revolvers, the means adopted in other cases were as follows:—Drowning, 3; hanging, 4; throat-cutting, 5; suicide on the railway, 4; opening the artery, 1; and poisoning, 4. One third of the suicides were of women.

The motives were varied. At least ten cases are traceable to love and jealousy. Four were the result of financial worries; three of the suicides were committed on the eve of marriage. It is remarkable that within two weeks of Sir Hector MacDonald's death, eight persons followed the General's example, and shot themselves, having in at least two instances previously declared they would follow "fighting Mac." The number of military men who have committed suicide lately has been extraordinary. Within two months twenty soldiers, including commissioned officers, have been responsible for their own deaths. Attempted suicides have during the last three months increased to the extent of sixty per cent. Along with the epidemic of suicides there has been an epidemic of mysteries. The police of the country are still investigating about fifty mysteries. Descriptions of twenty missing people and unidentified bodies have been circulated broadcast.

## THE WORD "WIFE"

What do you think the beautiful word 'wife' comes from? The great value of the Saxon words is that they mean something. Wife means 'weaver.' You must either be housewives or house moths, remember that. In the deep sense, you must either weave men's fortunes and embroider them or feed upon and bring them to decay. Wherever a true wife comes, home is always around her. The stars may be over her head, the glowworm in the night's cold grass may be at the fire at her feet, but home is where she is, and for a noble woman it stretches far around her, better than houses ceiled with cedar shedding its quiet life for those who else are homeless. This, I believe, is woman's true place and power.—Ruskin.
