ST. JOHN LETTER.

Montreal refuses to accept \$150,000 of Mr. Carnegie's money for the erection of a library building in which young and old, had it been accepted, would have been able, for generations, in their leisure moments, to commune with the great minds of the past and present, and so enable themselves to meet and overcome the vicissitudes of life in a manly fashion, instead of battling blindly with their troubles, and yielding to them, as they inevitably must, at last, and Montreal is in a condition of anarchy; it was in deference to the wishes of the anarchists that Mr. Carnegie's generosity was rejected. Every man who is employed has a right to quit his work when he will, provided that by so doing he violates no existing contract, but when he quits he has nothing more to do with his former employer or the man employed to fill his place. If he attempts to interfere with either he is an anarchist, a public enemy, and should be treated as such. The condition of civil war which prevails in almost every part of the United States should serve as a warning to Canadian legislators and employers of labor; if it is unheeded we shall soon be in a condition no better than that of the people of that country. We want to restrict immigration; we want none of the offshoots of Europe in our country; we want to deport the professional agitator the moment he arrives here as a dangerous character; a public enemy. Every industrial disturbance that we have experienced during the last ten years has been fanned into flame by emissaries from the United States or anarchistic immigrants.

HON. DAVID MILLS DEAD.

Ottawa, May 8.—Hon. David Mills, justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, died suddenly to-night at his own residence here. He was sitting quietly with his family in his own home, and before medical aid reached him he was dead.

Judge Mills was in good health today and was on the supreme court bench. Mrs. Mills and his daughter, Alice, were in the house at the time of his death.

The bursting of a blood vessel in the head is said to be the cause of death.

The particulars of Justice Mills' death are simple. After sitting with his family, he went upstairs and shortly after came down again, going on to the lawn to turn off the sprinkler. When he re-entered the house Mrs. Mills heard a groan, and found her husband in the hall leaning against the wall, and complaining that he could not breathe. Mr. John Christie, barrister, a near neighbour, was summoned and went for medical assistance. Drs. Kidd and Robertson quickly arrived, but too late. The cause of death was suffocation by the bursting of a blood vessel. The remains leave here on Monday morning.

One of his last important acts was the judgement in the case of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia in regard to representation in the house of commons.

Canada In The Eyes of Scotsmen.

To many of us Canada still remains our best, our cleanest, our greenest, most attractive colony. It may be that India is the "brightest jewel in the Imperial crown"; we read of the splendours of durbars and take it for granted; the sentiment is merely a phrase for most of us who are so privileged to see the crown or its jewels. Britons, as a rule, could never think of India as a permanent home, however convenient it may be for making money in, and that applies also to South Africa, which, in the common estimate of most of us, is a country barren of beauty, unromantic (save for such fierce romance as has been at the making there for a year past), and somehow wholly alien in its atmosphere, spoiled by vulgar, soulless much raking for diamonds and gold, and suspected, rightly or wrongly of being in the hands of the Jews. Australia and New Zealand come closer to the heart of the average Scotsman and Englishman than India or Africa, but we think of New Zealand as too remote, and of Australia as unhappy in an arid climate. Canada, of all our possessions overseas, with a climate like our own, yet infinitely superior, occupied for a century by our own race, made so largely by Scotsmen, as her geographical nomenclature indicates, and with a destiny better balanced between industrialism and the pastoral life than any other land gives promise of, is the colony that the Scot who is not a money-grabber and astray in his ideals, must most fondly contemplate. It is the "golden west" of our youth; when we see its name in print we must think of the rich rolling prairies, the huge forests, great lakes, mighty rivers, the buffalo, (alas no more!) the red-skin, stockhouse and portage. Are these not infinitely more precious words to the unspoiled mind than "Gympies," "Jumpers," or "Rands"? —Glasgow Evening News.

Canada is without an institution where young men can receive mechanical instruction. Last week one hundred and seventy-eight graduated from the New York Trade School. This school was established with a view to affording mechanical instruction in the various handicrafts. That it filled a want is proved by the fact that the graduates of last week hailed from twenty-seven states and several provinces of this Dominion. If it is a sound axiom, and nobody disputes it, that every child should have the chance of getting a common school education, it is equally beyond dispute that any youth who desires to learn a trade should be given the opportunity of doing so. Complaint is common that the colleges and universities have overstimulated the tendency among young men to crowd into the learned professions. It is true that there are too many of our young men seeking those professions. Lawyers and doctors are annually turned out in numbers altogether disproportionate to the requirements of society, while men who combine education with the practical knowledge of a trade are comparatively few and in pressing demand everywhere.

The wealthy men of Canada and the United States to-day are those who rose by industry and force of character from positions of working-men. Manual training and trade schools are agencies therefore most needful in our educational system for fitting young men for the active affairs of life. The topheaviness of society, resulting from a plethora of professionals and a dearth of capable handiworkmen, needs correcting. If some of our Canadian millionaires would contribute some of their acquired wealth towards the establishment of institutions for mechanical instruction they would be rendering greater service to mankind than they are doing by contributing in some other ways. —North Sydney Herald.

The Canadian Pacific land department sales for the month of April, totalled 207,344 acres for \$884,432. The sales for April last year were 231,127 acres for \$895,071.

CANADA'S REVENUE.

Ottawa, May 9.—The statement of revenue and expenditure of the Dominion for the 10 months ending April 30 was issued to-day.

The revenue amounted to \$52,361,841 an increase of \$5,761,113 over the same time last year. There was an increase in the expenditure of more than \$1,000,000 making a net betterment of \$4,762,484. The capital account was \$6,371,881, a decrease of \$2,928,707 compared with the 10 months last year. The details for the 10 months in each year are:—

The statement for the month of April shows an increase of \$500,000 in revenue and an increase of about \$250,000 in the expenditure.

According to an official statement issued on Friday at Semalia, India, the weekly plague mortality exceeds 30,000 persons. The infected area includes nine British provinces and fifty one native States. The natives drop on the streets and everywhere are visible piles of human bodies lying along thoroughfares. Great difficulty is found in burying the dead, the natives fearing to approach the victims. The stench from decaying bodies has been such that villages have been entirely deserted leaving the dead unburied and the sick uncared for.

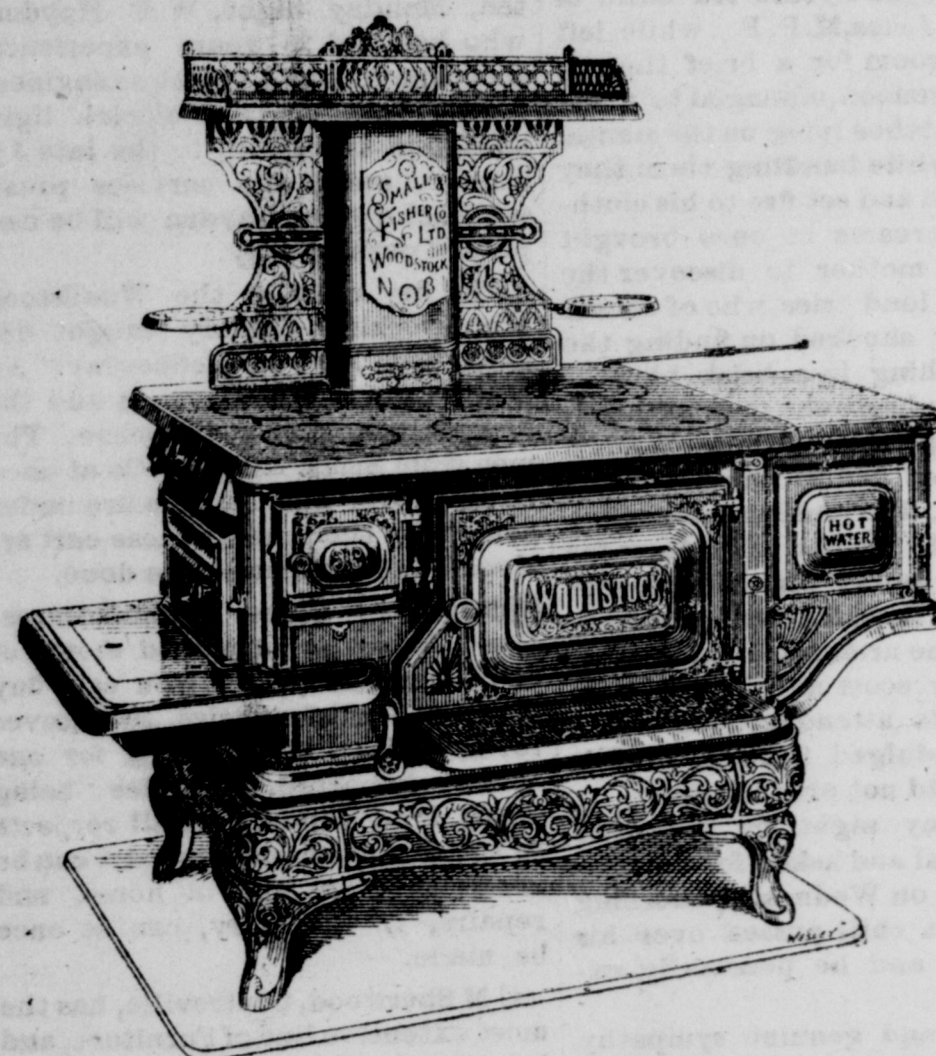
