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LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

MR TWEEDDALE'S SPEECH ON THE BUDGET.

Mr Tweeddale said the member for Charlotte had spoken of the Provincial debt, stating that the debt of \$10 per head on the population of New Brunswick is excessive in comparison with the debt of Canada, which represents the per capita indebtedness of the population of the Dominion, because the assets of Canada were its canals and railways. This shows the quality of reason upon which gentlemen opposite base their arguments. The canals and railways of Canada may be pointed to as answer for the expenditure of the revenue of Canada, which surely a gentleman, who seems to be so well informed will not claim that any Finance Minister of Canada would ever base his calculations for receipts to meet the current expenses of Canada upon revenue that he would receive from proceeds of canals or railways. Does the hon. member not understand that if the Government of the Dominion decided to pay up the bonded debt of Canada it would do so by the power it possesses of taking it directly from the pockets of its inhabitants through import and excise duties. Thus while the public works of Canada may be assets or security to represent the bonded debt of the country, the Dominion Government, when it wants revenue for current expenses for public works, or for the payment of Canadian bonds, can by a few strokes of the pen turn into its treasury millions of dollars. The public works, the crown lands, the subsidy from Dominion Government, its deposit in the Canadian treasury, and its fisheries, are the principal assets of New Brunswick and with all its bonded debt and in spite of the blue ruin cry of the Opposition in the House the bonds of this Province can be put upon the market to-day for as good a rate as can be obtained for the bonds of any Province in Canada, and this after all is the best test of how the capabilities of the Province are regarded in the money markets of the world. The liabilities of the country are based largely upon the confidence of its inhabitants in their country's capabilities, and the value of its securities are determined by the enterprise and business capabilities of the men who govern it. The bonded debt of this Province is not exceptional. Every city and every country whose inhabitants are at all progressive must and do draw on the resources to give it the development which advanced civilization demands. The city of St John for instance has a bonded debt equal to the bonded debt of this Province, and if it had not by the enterprise it has shown thus provided shipping and business facilities it could never hope to become a city of any importance, and yet you do not find the people of St John nor its civic rulers taking a pessimistic view of its future or crying out blue ruin. When the development and facilities are provided the business will come there and if the business is there the paying capacity is there. The same reasoning will apply to the Province.

The member for Charlotte in his criticism of the Surveyor General in administering the mining law was not very fair. It could not be called a criticism for it partook more of the quality of taking advantage of his position on the floor of the House to ventilate his grievance at his inability to get the Surveyor General to cancel a valid license for the benefit of the hon. member's clients. With regard to the criticism of the Opposition in the matter of expenditure I must say that the task was well and ably performed by the member for Carleton. It is the first time I have heard him and I had no idea he was so ingenious. He went through the expenditures of the different departments in the Auditor General's report and saw nothing but extravagance on every hand and throughout his whole speech he never pointed
