Ferry boats are again crossing the river at Clearview and River de Chute. Frazer's boat took leave one day, but was caught at Bath.

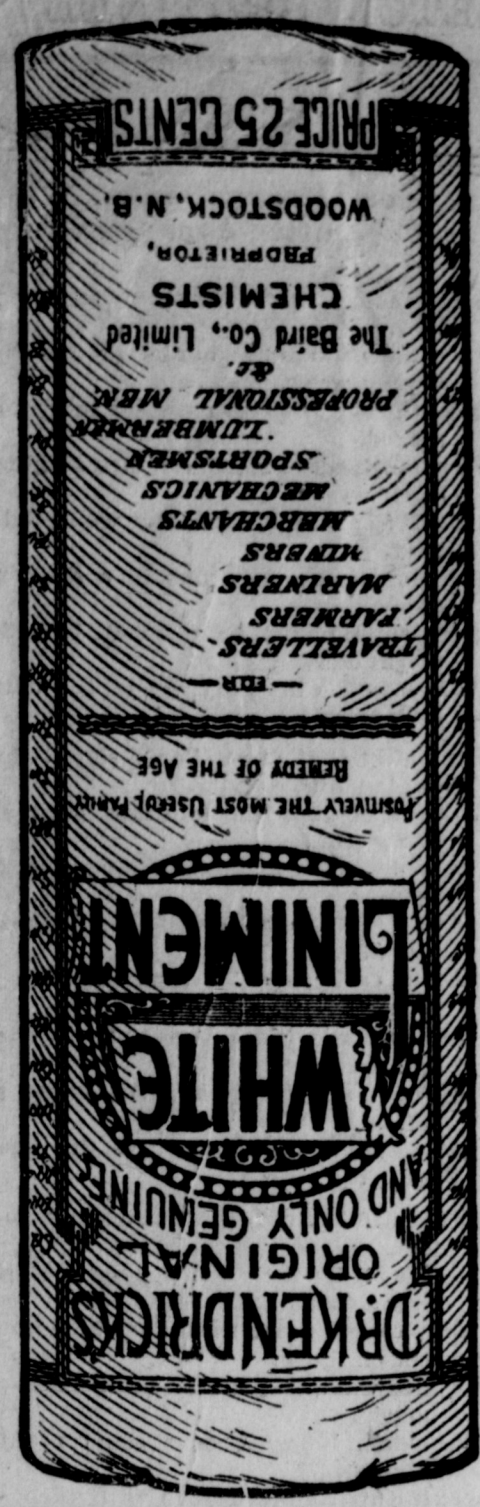
A number are engaged in the maple sugar business, and are taking the counsel given to them by Badger—suppose he has just wakened up from his winter's sleep.
