The London Daily Mail prophesies that Canada is about to become a great commercial nation.

Herr Noll, of Berlingen, in Germany, has made a clock warranted to go 9,000 years without winding.

Some Lessons from the Ontario Winter Fair.

(Concluded.)

FINISHING RANGE CATTLE IN THE EAST.

One feature of the Show which attracted a good deal of attention was a bunch of 24 range cattle from the Northwest, exhibited by the Territorial Dept. of Agriculture. These cattle were grade Shorthorns, Herefords and Galloways, and will be stabled and fed at the Agricultural College, and at Major Hood's farm at Guelph, Ont., with a view to ascertain whether a successful business can be done by Ontario farmers in "finishing" Western cattle. Only 15 per cent of the American range cattle are shipped direct to the market. The rest are shipped East and fed grain until they are in condition for slaughter, and that is one reason why American range cattle bring better prices than ours. In shipping our range cattle to England, they are so unaccustomed to confinement, that they usually reach the old country before they begin to eat. As they have to be slaughtered within ten days of their arrival, the loss in weight and price is very heavy. It is believed by Western men that if range cattle were shipped East and sold at some central point, such as Toronto, they could be laid down at \$35 to \$40 per head, leaving a good margin for the Ontario farmer.

GREAT BEEF PACKING CENTERS NEEDED.

In speaking of the outbreak of the foot and mouth disease in the United States and of the necessity of protecting Canadian herds from contagious diseases, Hon. Sydney Fisher drew attention to the advantages of having a dressed beef trade rather than an export trade in live cattle. Among other things he said: "The Americans have a dead meat trade. They have all the facilities of immense abattoirs and they can turn the stream from the live cattle to the dead meat trade in a very little time. But, if there were to occur a case of contagious disease in Canada tomorrow and the markets of the Old Country should be shut against our live stock trade we have no organized dead meat trade, no abattoirs here to slaughter our animals, no facilities for the transportation of that meat if it were prepared for the Old Country market, and that would be an almost fatal blow against the live stock trade of this country. Such a thing might occur in Canada at any moment; it matters not how careful the authorities may be. Such things have occurred in the old land. I believe the day has come in Canada when the ordinary dead meat trade must be organized, must be established, so that if such an incident should occur in this country, we should not be put to the enormous loss that we would to-day. We have an example of what can be done in the success of the bacon trade of Canada. The same can be

done in the dead beef trade. It will require the same business capacity, the same organization, the same capital that was required for the organization of the packing houses, and for the establishment of the bacon trade, the organization of an abattoir system in Canada, and a transportation system to carry the meat forward. I want to call the attention of the stockmen and capitalists of this province to this problem. I am quite sure the difficulties which have hindered it up to the present time have largely disappeared. One of these was the lack of a market for the offal. There will soon be a market here that all the different parts of the animal can be utilized. This being the case, I feel the time is now ripe for the establishment of a dead meat trade with the old country and that it must be brought about in the interests of the live stock of this country. Unless we take steps we are short sighted and we are closing our eyes to a danger with which we are face to face."

Hon. John Dryden emphasized what the Dominion Minister of Agriculture had said and added: "I hope that a year hence I shall be able to make an announcement concerning the establishment of an industry that will relieve us from the danger with which we are now confronted. Influences are even now at work which may bring this about, and it should be brought about."

Last Saturday morning Miss Eleanor Orr of this city was found dead in her bed, having been asphyxiated by coal gas. The dampers in the stove standing near the door of her room were closed and she had died in the sleep of suffocation. Murderer Higgins was removed to Dorchester last Saturday, where he is sentenced to spend the remainder of his life. Murderer Higgins has a large faith in the world's mercy and thinks he will be at liberty in ten years at farthest. However he had no mercy for his victim.

Frederick King and Theodore Morrison attacked Fred G Globe at Reed's Point last Saturday night and threw him off the wharf. He fell 20 feet before he struck water from which he was rescued by some of the crew of Steamer Yarmouth. King and Morrison are under arrest and probably will be "cautioned" by the police magistrate.

Three of the city's promising young men are in jail charged with burglary.

So far there has been less suffering among the poor of this city this winter than usual, especially among the coal dealers.

A young New York millionaire proposes to supply consumers with anthracite coal, in any quantity at cost, from a hod full to 100 tons, which is \$5.50 per ton, and about one third the price charged by the dealers.

So far St John's shipments of cattle to England this season exceed those of 1891-92, by more than 100 per cent.

Anthracite coal is sold in Boston and in this city at \$1 per 100 pounds, or in small quantities, at the rate of \$22.40 per ton. The Boston Herald proves that it costs the dealer only a little over \$7 a ton. A greater inquiry was never practised on this continent.

This season 6,143 head of cattle and 4,334 sheep have been shipped from this port to England. Last season the shipments to this date were 2,106 head of cattle and 2,499 sheep.

A LAND OF SLAVERY.

China is undoubtedly the greatest slave country in the world. Of a population of 400,000,000 over one-fourth are slaves. Every family of means keeps its girl slaves, and a man's position is usually gauged by the number of slaves he keeps. At any age from three to fifteen girls are sold, seven or eight being the age at which most change hands. The unfortunate slaves vary in price; the average is about £2, but much depends on the girl's appearance. A good looking girl will fetch £4 or even £8. The girls are mostly purchased to do housework, it being cheaper to buy than hire.
