INDIA'S DURBAR.

Carriages of Pure Silver and Sedan Chairs of Gold.

Delhi, India, Jan 7.—Almost incalculable wealth of gold and silver was displayed as the seemingly never-ending medley of elephants, camels, troops, musicians and carriages, representing the different Indian states, passed and manoeuvred before the dais. The elephants carried howdahs and trappings of the purest gold and silver. There were carriages of pure silver and sedan chairs of gold. During the temporary stoppages of the procession, half a dozen bands, some carried all on one elephant, played different airs, while the state retainers, clad in mail and armed with lances and swords, yelled their battle cries and fought in the arena. The Maharajah of Jaipur sent horsemen in armor, riding on golden saddles and carrying lances with red and white pennants. The Maharao of Kota sent many camels carrying swivel guns, a force of military ascetics and a number of quaint musicians. The camel men of the Maharajah of Alwar wore uniforms of blue and yellow. An elephant carriage, drawn by four elephants, followed the Alwar horsemen, who were clad in mail armor and whose horses reared in salute to the royal personages present. An elephant from the state of Datta also saluted the dais, saluting several times before it. The Sharmen of Burmah carried golden gongs and teapots and wore golden helmets. The carriage of the state of Jind was of pure silver and drawn by four black horses with golden harness. The carriage of the state of Patiala was also of silver decorated with gold. A dwarf from the state of Nabha was followed by a giant 7 feet 10 inches high. The contingent from Kashmir closed the procession.

The Duchess of Connaught wore a black and white dress and Lady Curzon appeared in a violet colored costume.

Why Black Men are Black.

It is not an accident that the skin of the African is black, but a provision of Nature to fit him for his surroundings, for a black skin can withstand the sun's rays better than a white one. It might be thought, perhaps, that, as black absorbs the rays, and white reflects them, it would have been better for Nature to give him a white skin; but this is not so. The reason is this. A white skin scorches and blisters under a hot sun, but a black skin does not, for it absorbs the rays, and carries the heat beneath. So far as bodily comfort is concerned, there is all the difference in the world between a scorched skin and one that is not scorched, and, therefore, the black man is fitted to withstand the Equatorial heat better. If you will bear this in mind until summer you may make a simple test of the matter. Put a white glove on one hand and a black one on the other, and expose them both to the sun. You will find that the hand with the black glove on feels hotter than the one with the white glove on, but it will not scorch and burn like the latter.

The Onion as a Medicinal Agent.

While it is generally known that a boiled onion is "good for a cold," it may not be so well known that it is valuable in chronic bronchitis. It acts as an expectorant, relieving the tubes, when eaten quite freely, as much as would any medicinal preparation. The uncooked onion, cut fine and eaten immediately, is still more powerful, but it is apt to irritate a delicate stomach. The raw onion is rather difficult to dissolve and the oil acts as an irritant. The following remedy has been tried with success in grave cases of capillary bronchitis affecting children. Cut up two or three large onions as fine as possible in order to do the work rapidly; place in a thin, soft muslin bag and lay on the chest; cover with a folded towel and bandage in position. It may be allowed to remain for several hours. The patient inhales a great part of the sulphide of allyl and the skin absorbs a certain amount and under the influence of this powerful drug the patient will fall asleep, the expectorations become freer, the breathing easier, the skin moist with perspiration, the temperature falls and the danger is overcome. In preparing raw onions for use dietetically, they must not be allowed to stand after they are cut, as they are great absorbents and also quickly yield their peculiar oils, thus losing strength and also furnishing possible agents for transferring disease germs.

A SUCCESSFUL SEASON.
The past season has been the most successful one ever experienced in Canada in the manufacture and export of butter and cheese. Cheese exports showed a total increase of 308,342 boxes over those for 1901, and a total increase of 22,353 boxes over those for 1900, while butter shipments showed an increase of 124,058 packages over those for 1901 and an increase of 278,388 packages over the season 1900. The disbursements to the factories for cheese was also largely in advance of any previous year, cheese being constantly one or two cents higher than the previous season. Butter makers were not relatively so fortunate, the price of butter being lower during most of the season than it was in 1901.—Ex.
