## EPWORTH LEAGUE.

The meeting of the Methodist Epworth League on Friday evening last was under the direction of the social department of the League and was of an unusually interesting character. The exercises involved a test of the acquaintance of the young people with the faces of eminent men and women of the past and present. Some twenty portraits were fastened on each of four sheets of cardboard, each picture having affixed to it a number. The gathering was then divided into four groups and to each group was given one of the sheets containing twenty of the numbered pictures and to each person a slip of paper containing a column of numbers. The work of the groups was to guess who was who, and to record their guess after the proper number on the slip. A prize was offered for the one guessing the largest number. The young people entered into the contest with great zest, and the result was such as to show that a goodly proportion of them had heard about the men prominent in the church, in science, in literature and in politics and that they had heard sufficient about them to cause them to fix their faces in their memory as they scanned the pictures provided in current literature. The occasion was generally voted social and instructive. This week the Christian Endeavor department have charge of the exercises. The subject of the meeting tonight will be "John Knox," the third in the series of "Great Religious Leaders." Rev. A. D. Archibald, of Debec, is to deliver the address.—(Reprinted by request.)

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:

What I want to do is to awaken the sympathies of the municipal councillors that something might be done in behalf of those industrious people who have so diligently toiled late and early and reaped nothing.

I think there is an act of parliament that allows the local government to take the by-road money and buy seed for those whose crops have been destroyed by the storms. If there isn't an act to that effect there ought to be one. Remember, Mr. Editor, this has been for two years in succession. Now councillors of the county of Carleton can't you do something to help those men to get started once more. I will tell you what you have done. You have allowed the tax collectors to collect taxes from those people for these two years. There are several cases of which I know, where people have been deprived of the necessities of life to pay that tax.

Now, Mr. Warden, don't you think the taxes of the last two years should be refunded to those people with an apology for taking it.

Now, Mr. Editor, this is a case which should interest every man in the county of Carleton. While our government is spending hundreds of thousands of dollars to bring immigrants into the country, I think the province or county should pay those people for every bushel of grain that was destroyed by the hail that they might be able to stay in the country and be prosperous and industrious farmers as they have been in the past. This may be socialism, but I will say with the poet—

He gives but little who gives his tears,  
He does better who aids and cheers,  
Who drives the wolf from the poor man's door.

## Christmas Canadian Magazine.

The coloured cover of the Christmas Canadian Magazine is emblematic of the season and of the contents. There are several Christmas stories, and an article by Sarah A. Tooley on Sandringham House, where the King and Queen have spent Christmas for each of the last forty years. The coloured illustrations for this article, the two full-page pictures of a Lake Huron Harbour by Moonlight, the coloured portrait of Sir William Mulock, and the tinted illustrations for the closing chapters of the War of 1812, give a brightness to the number. The story illustrations by C. H. Warren and J. E. McBurney are above the average. The illustrated article on Toronto, "A Typical Canadian City," is a splendid feature. The symposium on "Canada and Mr. Chamberlain," to which John Charlton, M. P., Chancellor Wallace, Professor Shortt, Sir Thos. Shaughnessy, W. C. Nichol and Hon. R. P. Roblin contribute, is informing in that different views of the question are freely given. Mr. Gadsby's brief character sketch of Sir William Mulock will be read with interest. In "Woman's Sphere," Miss Helliwell describes the origin of many Christmas customs. In "People and Affairs" Mr. Cooper deals with Canada's demand for greater self-governing powers, with Imperial postage and the flow of Canadian graduates to the United States. The other departments are decidedly interesting. Undoubtedly this is a brilliant number.
