Forest Fires in Country Around Woodstock.

The N. B. Telephone Co., through the Woodstock Central furnishes the SENTINEL with the following account of forest fires up to Wednesday evening:

There was eight buildings burned at the Cold Stream, result of forest fires.

At Mount Pleasant there was a large piece of woods on fire and it was reported that a couple of buildings.

On the line of the C. P. R. between County Line and Gravel Hill, the woods were on fire for a great distance, and several families burned out.

St. Croix Station, on the B. & A. Railway was burned and the trains had to turn back to Ashland.

All the men in Avondale had to turn out to fight fire, and the same happened at Lakeville, but no buildings were burned, although the fire came close at one time.

There was between four and five hundred acres of timber land burned between McAdam and St. Stephen.

The road between Meductic and Canterbury was on fire on both sides and no teams could get through.

The woods on the opposite of the river from Meductic caught on fire and the sparks caught in the door-ways on the Meductic side of the river and they had to carry water and put the fire out or it would have set the house on fire, and on the opposite side of the river at Hawkshaw the fire burned almost to the waters edge, and very near to the village on their own side of the river. Wiggin's mill was in danger. The fire burned two poles down below Temperancevale, and interrupted the telephone service.

The woods below the poorhouse were on fire and the ashes fell in the town during the afternoon.

Houlton had to refuse to send help to Benton as they were surrounded by fire and could not spare the help.

TRIAL FARM.

W. W. Hubbard, agricultural agent of the C. P. Railway, was here last week superintending the planting of his miniature experimental farm, located at the Lower C. P. R. station.

The size of his farm is one-half acre, and this plot he divided into sections, and in these he planted a variety of fodder seeds, such as rape, vetches, alfalfa, and various grasses not now grown in New Brunswick.

The experiment is made with a view of testing the value of the various crops for our climate and soil. The result will be watched with interest by our farmers.

N. B. TELEPHONE NOTES.

Stanley Ebbett, Fredericton, and four men are working on the up-river line, of the telephone service.

The first shipment towards the extension of the line north has arrived. On Saturday 1000 cross-arms were freighted to Newburg Junction, and later a car load of wire was landed at Woodstock. About 3000 poles have been bought and placed at different points, to be ready for the contemplated work next week.

A crew of men under Tim Fields has examined all the poles and re-set the wire between this town and boundary line store, the first time that a thorough overhauling of that line has been made since its installation seven years ago.

At the annual meeting of the Methodist Sunday School, held last week, when the reports submitted were of an encouraging nature, the following officers were elected: C. L. Smith, superintendent, re-elected; Andrew Myles, assistant supt., re-elected; B. Griffiths, secretary re-elected; Arthur Smith, assistant; H. Stevens, librarian, and H. McLaughlan, assistant. The old staff of teachers were re-elected.
