In reply to the above I would say I have had eighteen years experience in the cooper business, twelve of which was spent in some of the largest and best equipped factories in the United States, and two years as foreman for the Meductic Meat Co. I would further state that the machinery used by the Meductic Meat Co. is of the best for the purpose intended, and our helpers are equally skilled as those usually employed in such industries, and while I am at present located somewhat remote from the centres of trade, yet I am enabled, through the medium of the Coopers' Magazines, to keep posted and to attain a certain amount of skill in my profession.

Regarding the above statement by Robert G. Ferguson, I would state that I was one of the boys that was putting the firkins together the day the committees from the Town Council and the Board of Trade visited the Meductic Meat Co.'s works, and consider myself skilled in my profession, having served twenty years at the cooper business in some of the largest cooperages in St. John city. The barrel factory of the Meductic Meat Co. is as well equipped with machinery as any factory in the city of St. John, and our apprentices to the trade satisfactory.

I am at the present time working on a car load of barrels to fill an order for the St. John market, and the barrels are of a kind that require skilled workmen to manufacture.

OBITUARIES.

MRS ZEBULON CURRIE.

Mrs Z Currie, who has been a resident of this town for eighteen years, removing here from Gibson, York County, died of heart failure, on Friday evening of last week, at her residence, Wellington ward, in the 75th year of her age. 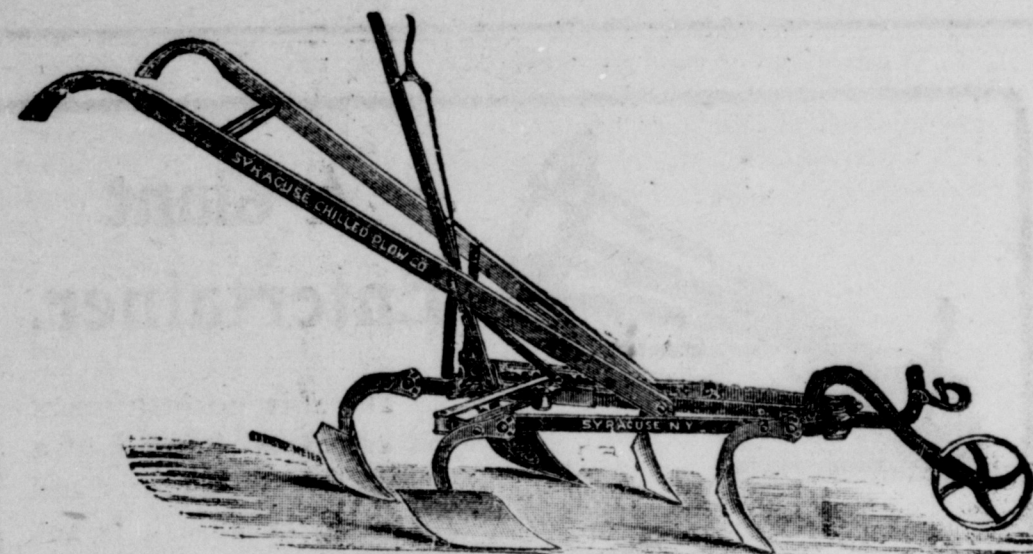

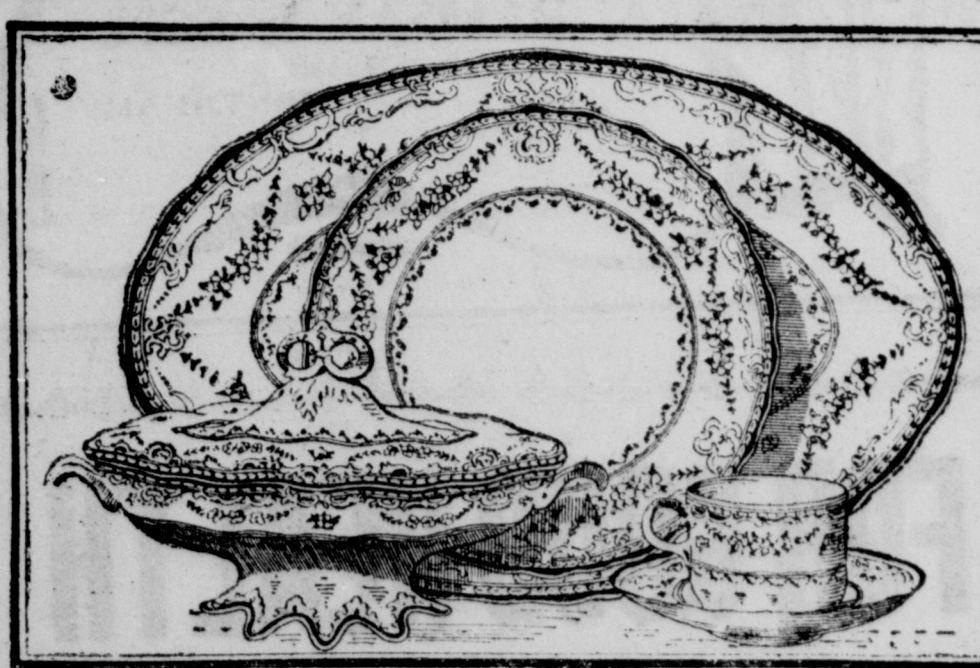
