## The Bonus Question Again.

Our article in the last issue relating to the proposed Bonus to Mr A W Hay seems to have raised the ire of both our local contemporaries, but it has had the effect of obtaining a positive statement from Mr Hay that his present plan is not to be accepted beforehand at \$10,000, in estimating the property upon which he is to receive a bonus. This was very necessary in view of the facts of the case, which are as follows:—When the joint committees of the Board of Trade and the Town Council met Mr Hay at Lower Woodstock some weeks ago, he informed them that his present plan had cost upward of \$10,000, and if he moved to Woodstock it would have to be valued at \$10,000, or one half of the plant which he would have to erect, in order to obtain a bonus of \$5,000, and in an actually asked one of the committees to get Mr A B Connell to prepare a Resolution to that effect to be passed by the Town Council.

The fact of Mr Hay laying this down as one of the conditions upon which he could come here, coupled with the action of the Council in ordering the vote being taken, fully justified the public in assuming that they had agreed to Mr Hay's terms. We are glad that our reference to the matter has now produced the positive statement from Mr Hay above referred to, which we accept in full, and now the vote can be taken upon its merits.

Those interested in promoting the inauguration of the bonus system in the Town of Woodstock, instead of abusing the SENTINEL, should thank us for having these unpleasant rumors set at rest, for the vote certainly would not have carried had not this matter been settled.

We do not think that the individual members of the Town Council will thank The Press for its vigorous defence of their reputations. There is always danger of creating suspicion by such a course on the part of one's friends.

The statement in the SENTINEL that Mr Hay was not bound by the speeches of any member of the Town Council, is certainly no reflection on the members thereof.

The whole trend of the different articles published in the The Press and Dispatch seems to be to brand every person whose views do not exactly coincide with theirs, as Traitors to the Town, forgetting the fact that this is a question upon which citizens may honestly differ, and we have no doubt but that those who may to-day record their votes against the Bonus, have the interests of the Town just as much at heart as have our friends who are making so much noise about it.

The fact that the Dispatch is able to take a decided stand upon this question is pretty good evidence that it is one with which Dominion and Provincial politics have nothing to do as stated in its last issue, and we fail to see the necessity for any reference to politics in discussing the question of a bonus. But when our contemporary does take a stand, it would be wise to quote the law as it is, and not try to mislead the public by stating that any rate-payer who may doubt that the plan to be erected by Mr. Hay would be worth \$20,000, "may insist on the appointment of assessors to determine its proper value," as our contemporary must know that the question of value is entirely one for the Town Council to deal with, and not for any individual rate-payer.

We are astonished to find a statement such as the following in the columns of the Dispatch: "Woodstock must have more manufacturing industries or perish a dry rot." This may serve our contemporary's personal purpose, but we think it very unwise to scatter broadcast over the country any such misleading statement as to the condition of our town to-day. Such statements will not encourage capitalists to come here even when a bonus is offered them.

We trust that every rate-payer will go the poll to-day and cast his vote according to his convictions, so that a small amount of property will not decide so important a matter. And we wish to remind the citizens that every rate-payer has the right to vote on his or her entire property assessment whether it be real, personal or both.

## POLITICS IN THE WEST.

The storm centre of political fury is moving westward. Following close upon the Gamey charges in the Ontario house and the highly aroused party feeling in that province, comes news of the early appeal to be made by the Manitoba government, and the extreme activity of both parties in the endeavor to secure the endorsement of the electorate. The conservatives have a large majority in the present legislature, but in this fight will be without the element of personal strength lent by Hugh John Macdonald in the last contest. Premier Roblin has not by any means been a success as a legislator, some pernicious railway legislation being particularly displeasing. There is good reason for thinking that Hon. Thomas Greenway will before many months occupy his old position to the right of the Speaker.

In British Columbia political changes have been exceedingly frequent. Colonel Prior, recently ousted from the premiership, although a strong conservative, derived considerable support from the liberal party. The present premier, Hon. Richard McBride, has called only conservatives to seats in the executive, and has announced himself as a straight party man, giving preference to, and looking for support from conservatives only. This is an act of base ingratitude to several very strong liberal members of the late house, without whose assistance this young gentleman would never have attained the dignity of the premiership. The liberals of the Pacific coast are composed of first class fighting material, have excellent organization, and will doubtless relegate the present provincial rulers to the opposition benches. We would not at all be surprised if after the present western campaigns are over, the last vestige of Tory rule from the Atlantic to the Pacific, would be wiped out of existence. The west is liberal at heart. Thirteen out of seventeen members of the House of Commons, west of Lake Superior, are supporters of the Laurier government. It only remains for the party to exert its strength and victory will be assured.

## EDITORIAL NOTES.

The property holders vote on the bonus question to-day. Indications are that a fairly large vote will be polled.

THE Craddock industry at Upper Woodstock is thriving, although it has not received any large concessions such as we hear of others seeking.

As the date for the great yacht race grows nearer, public interest quickens apace. It is to be hoped that Shamrock III. will not slacken her pace.

H. J. CLORAN, a prominent liberal of Montreal, is mentioned as successor to the late Senator O'Brien. The government majority in the Upper Chamber is growing fast.

HON. CLIFFORD SIFTON is back from London, where he had been actively assisting in the preparation of the British side of the case in the Alaskan Boundary dispute.

## Mr. Henderson Goes West.

A. Henderson will start on Monday for a trip to Toronto and other Upper Canadian points. He goes in order to induce capitalists to lend assistance to the enlargement of his furniture industry. With him he is taking an interesting collection of native woods comprising ash, elm, birch, maple, beech, butternut, basswood and poplar. All of these can be secured here at fully fifty per cent less than in Ontario. Freight rates are also in our favor. There is every reason for thinking that Mr. Henderson will be successful in his mission. He is no amateur in his line and knows whereof he speaks.

## HYMENEAL.

A very pretty marriage was solemnized at Centreville, on Wednesday evening, June 24th, between Captain Anson A. H. Margison and Miss Annie Lee. The ceremony was performed at the residence of the bride's father, Mr Alfred J. Lee by the rector of the parish, Rev. E. W. Simonson. The bride was elegantly gowned in white with veil and orange blossoms. The groom is the only son of Mr Leonard Margison of Centreville.

Mrs William A Connolly and Mrs John E Estey of Jacktown, met with a serious accident on Saturday night. While driving a spirited horse, the animal became frightened at the noise made by a truck wagon. He ran away, throwing out the occupants of the carriage and injuring them severely.

## Carleton County Hospital.

## FIRST ANNUAL MEETING.

The first annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Carleton County Hospital was held in the Town Council Chamber on Tuesday afternoon, Dr W D Rankin in the chair.

Of the trustees, the only absentee was Rev W F Chapman. The other gentlemen present were Messrs Frank B Carvell, H Paxton Baird, D McLeod Vince and F H J Dibblee.

The report of the directors was read by Dr Rankin. It stated that in the ten and a half months, during which the hospital has been in operation, nearly eighty patients have been treated, and deducting those who were received in a moribund condition, the percentage of successful cases has been very high. It is extremely gratifying to the public to learn that the finances are also in good condition, and that the work of the institution is in such good hands. The new matron, Miss McBride, is proving herself a worthy successor to Miss Ross, and she is being assisted by a competent and efficient staff of helpers.

On motion the report was ordered printed for distribution.

Rev G D Ireland and Dr T F Sprague, the retiring trustees, were unanimously re-elected.

Mr H P Baird, in very felicitous terms, moved a hearty vote of thanks to the Trustee Board for the able manner in which they have discharged their duties.

In seconding this motion, Mr F B Carvell expressed his surprise and pleasure in listening to the report. In his opinion there had never been an institution established in the town or county that was doing, and he believed would continue to do, so much good as the hospital. The hearty support of the whole county should be given to the institution.

The motion was unanimously carried. Dr Rankin modestly replied for the trustees, after which the meeting adjourned.

## Interesting Golf Match.

There has always been genuine rivalry, though of a friendly sort, between the St. John golfers and the local enthusiasts of the game. Several matches have been played with varying result, the home team generally winning. On Tuesday evening a party of ten arrived from St. John, and after a comfortable night spend at the Carlisle, were conveyed by backboards to the links. Here they found ten of the best local players ready to make an effort to down them, and after a hard contest the visitors were taken into camp by a majority of thirteen holes. The play on the whole was good, although some of the contestants seemed to have an off day. Perhaps the star work was done by Doctor Sprague, who made the first two holes in two strokes each, finishing the round in forty-three.
