The Bonus Question Again.

Our article in the last issue relating to the proposed Bonus to Mr A W Hay seems to have raised the ire of both our local contemporaries, but it has had the effect of obtaining a positive statement from Mr Hay that his present plant is not to be accepted beforehand at \$10,000, in estimating the property upon which he is to receive a bonus. This was very necessary in view of the facts of the case, which are as follows :--When the joint committees of the Board of Trade and the Town Council met Mr Hay at Lower Woodstock some weeks ago, he informed them that his present plant had cost upward of \$10,000, and if he moved to Woodstock it would have to be valued at \$10,000, or one half of the plant which he would have to erect, in order to obtain a bonus of \$5,000, and la er on actually asked one of the committees to get Mr A B Connell to prepare a Resolution to that effect to be passed by the Town Council. The fact of Mr Hay laying this down as one or the conditions upon which he could come here, coupled with the action of the Council in ordering the vote being taken, fully justified the public in assuming that they had agreed to Mr Hay's terms. 




