FLORENCEVILLE SUPERIOR SCHOOL.

Tuesday afternoon, June 30th, was a red-letter one in the history of our Superior School. The weather though warm was charming. The choruses, Welcome Song, The Land of the Maple and Farewell Song, were finely rendered. The first was bright; the second vigorous; the last peculiarly touching. The solos, The Letter Edged in Black, by Mr Arthur Jewett, and For the Flag I Die, by Miss Hazel McCain, and duet, A Bunch of Maple Leaves, by Misses Muriel McCain and Helen Charlton, were good. Miss Hazel McCain presided at the organ during the exercises.

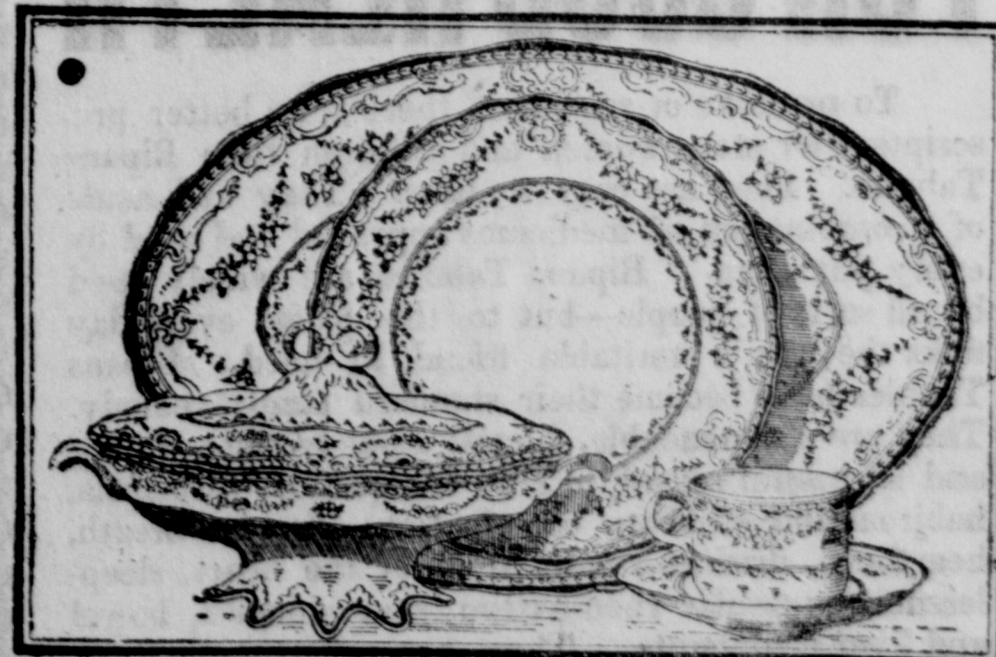
