UNMUSICAL WOLVES.

An incident just reported from Sivas, Turkey, seems to prove that the feeling which music awakens in wolves is fright. Two musicians—a drummer and piper—returning to their village from a wedding party were overtaken by a snowstorm and sought refuge in a deserted mill. They lit a fire with some wood they found in the place and were warming themselves when they saw a wolf emerge from a dark corner of the building. They jumped up on a shelf and, to their dismay, saw several more wolves join the first. The animals rushed in their direction, and the drummer, at a loss for a mode of defence, set to beating his drum, whereupon his companion instinctively played his pipe. The effect was marvelous. The music so terrified the wolves, that they attempted to run away, and as the door was closed, they began fighting, and several of them were torn to pieces, the survivors eventually escaping through a hole in the wall. This incident is vouched for by the Government Gazette of Sivas.

Lord Milner on the Race Question.

At this time it is particularly interesting to read what Lord Milner said in a recent speech in Johannesburg, touching on the race question, which is becoming very acute in South Africa. He said that no man condemned more than he what was popularly described as the Exeter Hall view—that is, a sentimental and ignorant view of native questions; but he feared that they cherished in South Africa the opposite sort of claptrap. Behind that claptrap was the truism that the white man must rule, but his right must be based on civilization not on color. The necessity of this rule did not involve the attempt to keep the black man always at his low level of civilization. On the contrary, the strongest reason for white rule was that it gave the only possibility of raising the black man to a higher level. But if civilization was the ground for white supremacy, then exceptional natives, who approximated to the white level of civilization were entitled to white treatment. The question of the political rights of the black man had been left to future decision, but the government had put forward a legislative proposal not basing the right to the municipal vote on color, and though the question would be much debated, expressing his personal opinion, Lord Milner said that he urged the unwisdom of discouraging native progress by a policy of exclusion toward exceptional natives qualified for white privileges and he pleaded for the doctrine—equal rights for every civilized man.

"The pole can be reached. Of that I am certain. I would be glad to make another attempt." Commander Robert E. Peary, who is a guest at the Saratoga Limited Club, at Saratoga, made this statement on Saturday. "The expenditure of \$150,000 would make it possible for our land to win this prize," he went on. "I don't know of anybody who wants to provide the money, but I am sure it would be worth the while."
