Temperance Man Hits Hard.

A MC Lawson, of Havelock, delivered the weekly temperance address in St. John recently. Rev Samuel Howard presided. Mr Lawson said several original and striking things in condemnation of the liquor traffic and in the course of his remarks alluded to the steamer May Queen as a floating rum shop. 'At least she was that last summer,' said Mr Lawson, 'but I trust it will be unnecessary to apply the same term to her during the coming summer.'

The speaker read a newspaper clipping in which a reward was offered for information leading to the conviction of any person killing a bull moose out of season. In a strong and outspoken way Mr Lawson asked why rewards were not offered for the conviction of liquor sellers. They were guilty of taking the lives of their fellow men. Was the life of a moose of more value than the life of a man?

Mr Lawson drew attention to the recently completed seven story building in Mill street. In the building will be conducted a liquor business. 'How many have an interest in this new establishment?' asked Mr Lawson. 'I say the majority of the widows, the orphans, the drunks of this city are part owners. Each may not own more than a brick, but their money has helped toward the completion of the building.'

Mr Lawson contended it was folly to spend money in establishing new schools, when much of their beneficial effects were destroyed by the saloons which were permitted to flourish by the mere paying of a license. The magistrate, the law makers, he said, were sharers in the spoils of the rum seller.

CIGARETTES.

We want boys, too, and young men to read with attention and earnest thought this statement by Magistrate Crane: "Ninety-nine out of a hundred boys between the ages of ten and seventeen years who come before me charged with crime have their fingers disfigured by the yellow cigarette stains."

That is to say, ninety-nine out of a hundred of all the lads charged with crime, from misdemeanors to burglars, have had their moral sense weakened by the poison of cigarettes.

Fathers and mothers, especially fathers, should think about this too. The father who permits his young son to smoke, whose carelessness or indifference fails to see that the child is poisoning his mind and his body, is a derelict parent, and fails in his duty to society.

Magistrate Crane says: "I am not a crank on this subject. I do not care to pose as a reformer. But it is my opinion that cigarettes will do more than liquor to ruin boys." The magistrate goes on to say that the practice of smoking cigarettes among boys is increasing to an alarming extent.

This is due to the vigorous efforts of the cigarette manufacturers to palm off their poisonous trash on the children of other people. It is due to the fact that the public conscience fails to discourage cigarette smoking by boys as it should do.

The boy with a cigarette in his mouth or in his hands is ruining his chances, his health and his morals just as surely as if he held a whisky glass in his hand.

The police who eagerly make an arrest when a child is sent for a pail of beer by his father show utter indifference in allowing children to smoke on every street corner.

Magistrate Crane outlined as follows the course of the boy who begins by smoking cigarettes—and what he says is based on no theory, but on his personal observations as a police magistrate, upon hundreds of sentences that he has been compelled to pass.

This is the progress of the unfortunate child who begins cigarette smoking—at least in many cases:—First, cigarettes. Second, beer and liquor. Third, craps, petty gambling. Fourth, horse racing gambling on a bigger scale. Fifth, larceny. Sixth, state prison.

The police pursue vigorously the keeper of an opium den. They make periodicals forays in the Chinese quarters, looking for opium pipes. Cigarettes smoked by children in this country do every year ten thousand times as much harm as has ever been done here by opium from the beginning of time.—N. Y. Journal.

A WARNING TO YOUNG MEN.

In the Opera House, recently, at Calgary, the Rev G W Kerby, spiritual adviser to Ernest Cashe, who was hanged on February 2nd, delivered a message to young men which Cashe had left. The Opera House was crowded to its utmost limits. Great interest was taken in the letter, in which Cashe wrote his warning to young men. The letter was as follows:—

"Advice to young men. Remember, boys, I am not in a position to make any exaggerations. Here is my experience in regard to books such as Diamond Dicks and Nick Carters and James Boys. I think by my experience that they are the starting of a romantic life. I know I used to read these books before I left home and think how nice it would be if I could be with a gang of brigands."

"Well, boys, I did have lots of fun as long as it lasted. But, when my days were numbered, I thought of my romantic life, boys! O, boys, take my advice and stay away from saloons and gambling houses and shun bad company, especially the house of ill-fame, for you know one bad woman is worse than ten bad men. She can lead you into the clutches of the devil before you are aware of the fact. I used to read novels when I was home, (Buffalo, Wyo.) boys, those Diamond Dicks and Nick Carters, and that started me to going into bad company, drinking, gambling, and the first thing I knew I was looking out from behind the bars."

"I met some bad men in the jail and we planned an escape and I got out, but they caught me again and I got out again, and for five years I had to leave my dear ones at home and go among strangers, lay out nights, go without anything to eat for two days at a time, be wet and cold.
