## Lyon World's Champion Beat Egan 3 up, 2 to Play.

St. Louis, Sept. 24.—George S. Lyon, the representative of Canada in the Olympic championship play, defeated Howard Chahdler Egan, the American champion, to-day for the championship of the world, by 3 up and 2 to play. Egan was pretty nervous thruout his play to-day, frequently slicing into the long grass. A heavy rain and wet fields were not sufficient to keep a large gallery from following the play.

Your correspondent interviewed Mr. Lyon to-night at Glen Echo Country Clubhouse, where he was the central figure of a reception.

"I can assure you that my victory was not without a hard struggle," he said, modestly. "My competitors were worthy men; without doubt, the best golf players on the American continent. I was 1 up in the morning, and increased my lead to 4 at the end of the fifth hole. I won on my long game. Mr. Egan was a little better than I on the short game. I leave for Toronto to-morrow (Sunday) morning at 9 o'clock over the Wabash Railway, and will reach Toronto Monday morning. I am as happy as the day is long. I never felt better physically in my life than I do at this moment. I am a trifle tired, but not too tired to dance."

Then, excusing himself courteously from your correspondent, he hurried to another end of the big reception room, where he was introduced to a number of charming girls who had been eyeing him admiringly. A few minutes later he was waiting.

The prize is a massive trophy and the Olympian gold medal. Egan lost the first hole to his veteran rival shortly after 11 o'clock in the morning in a deluge of rain, and in a route of 34 hard-fought holes was never up on the Canadian, playing a very erratic game.

Lyon played far the steadier golf of the two, and was almost uniformly straight from the tee, while Egan was unable to control his long game. Lyon led from the first hole to the 34th, where the match ended, and, altho Egan showed flashes of his best work, and repeatedly crept up, he could not quite catch up, and the match was never square.

## LYON'S GOLF A REVELATION.

Lyon's golf was a revelation, a rebuke to those who say the boys now have all the best of it in the royal and ancient game. He is a heavily-built man and puts every ounce possible in his strokes, driving a terrific ball and almost always straight down the middle. His iron play and putting also is deadly, and he was always well up to the hole from the green's edge.

Lyon stood 1 up at noon, after a match played in a drenching rain, the storm never letting up until the 17th hole was being played. The Canadian started off at a marvelous rate, standing 4 up after the first five holes, and making the first nine in 37, despite the water-soaked course.

"I deserve to lose," said Mr. Egan after the game. "The golf played by Mr. Lyon was superior to mine. Any time I fail to get away tee shots I merit defeat. Honestly, I may say that I was not in physical condition to play a hard game at any time this week. Last week's team matches were trying on me, and 36 holes a day for more than a week made me stale, to say nothing of long play in the western and the national and the long railway journey."
