Naval Battles at Port Arthur and Chemulpo.

Though well aware that the world must know that it has had the best of the fighting so far, Japan is by no means crowing over it as some other nations would have done. It knows For he saw an angel enter, that it is not "out of the wood" yet, Dressed in garments white andnew. and meantime is saying very little from other sources it appears to have sustained comparatively no damage in these two naval engagements. On the other hand, Russia had eleven ships struck in the battle at Port Arthur; the cruiser Askold got a big hole at the water line, and had to be towed into the inner bosin and beached; the battleship Sevastopol also got a shell hole in her water line, and is now said to be useless in rough weather; the cruiser Novik got a hole in her port side; the battleship Retvizan was so damaged that she had to be beached, where it is said

her bottom has since fallen out the cruiser Pallada was torpedoed abaft her engine room and rendered useless; the battleship Cesarevitch was also torpedoed and had to be docked, &c. In fact the whole Russian fleet there had to be taken into the inner harbour, where it is being protected by the forts. It does not appear, however, that any Russian vessels were actually sunk during

Fewer ships were engaged in the battle at Chemulpo, but there again Japan was successful. On the 9th inst, three Japanese cruisers approached Chemulpo harbour, where two Russian cruisers, the Korietz and Variag, were lying. The latter were given until noon to come out and fight, otherwise they would be attacked where they were. They went out, and a keen battle took place about ten miles from the harpour. It began when the contending vessels were about six miles apart. After an hour's fighting the Variag was seen to be on fire near the stern. and listing heavily to port. She was evidently sinking, having been struck in six places, and on returning to the harbour was abandoned. The Korietz was said to have escaped, yet on returning to the harbour was abandoned, and blew up with a terrific explosion.
