## Prevalence of Social Drinking.

We have long contended that one of the greatest elements of danger in connection with the liquor traffic is the veneer of respectability that its friends and apologists would fain throw over it. A few years ago, it did seem as if the mists were falling from the eyes of the people, and they began to see the liquor traffic in all its hideous perspective. It no longer was thought necessary to serve intoxicants at local functions as heretofore. In the rural districts the farmers commenced to demonstrate that barn raisings, logging bees, threshings and other similar gatherings could be even more successfully conducted when the beer barrel was no longer in evidence.

But, alas, that we have to record it! To-day the pendulum seems to be swinging backward, and it is high time a note of alarm should be sounded. At social gatherings, liquor guised in jellies and ices, is served. "The punch bowl" is again in evidence, and too often presided over by young girls whose witching loveliness makes a refusal of its contents all the more difficult. At some of these gatherings, Christian women have been invited guests, not dreaming that friends of theirs could so tamper with the "accursed stuff," and they have accepted the invitation, and, saddened and horrified, have borne testimony to the statements above. That we are not speaking without a definite knowledge of the real facts of the case, the appended instances which have either been told us by credible witnesses or have come under the personal observation of friends, give sad but true evidence:—

"A society woman in one of our provincial towns said to a friend, 'I do not know of any other place in this Dominion where the upper crust is so morally rotten.' As illustration of this, she gave the following: 'She went to a ball given by one of the fashionable gentlemen's clubs. A bar was situated just off the hall where the dancing was going on, and, between the dances, the rule was for the gentlemen to take their partners to the bar and treat them to liquor. The result was that when it came time to go home, a goodly number of the women were staggering drunk.'

"At a social given by a fashionable family the remark was made that 'if as much attention had been given to the other details of the entertainment as was lavished upon the champagne, it would have been a greater success.'"  
"At a large ball given at one of the most fashionable houses of London, a few weeks ago, every guest present was served with a whisky soda shortly after arriving, with a view to stimulating their appetite for the good things that would be served later on."

We might go on multiplying instances if need be, but surely enough has been said to arouse every woman interested in the temperance cause to do her utmost to stem this tide of evil, which, if not checked, will overflow our fair Dominion. Not only our sons but our daughters, are in jeopardy.

In some circles the serving of light wines at afternoon receptions and "at homes," instead of tea and coffee as formerly, is becoming sadly prevalent. A few days ago one of our own White Ribboners told us of being at such a gathering. We are glad to record that even at the risk of appearing discourteous and peculiar, she kept her pledge inviolate.

Our young girls are asked to assist in the serving of such, and not all are as brave as one of whom we know, who went to her hostess and told her as kindly and politely as she could that she dare not assume the responsibility of placing temptation in the pathway of others.

Dear White Ribboners our duty is clear, our pathway plain. Let us ask God for strength to make such a definite, firm stand on this question that in the community in which we live our influence will be at once felt.

Wherever there is a probability of wines or intoxicants in any form being served, it is surely our duty to courteously decline, and when opportunity offers let us voice our protest against a sin so terrible and far reaching in its awful consequences. —Canadian White Ribbon Tidings.

As an item of interest, by actual count, I ascertained that on June 16, 1904, there passed over the Meduxakik and river bridges in Woodstock, 2500 people and 1600 horses. The horses and carriages that are driven into Woodstock are first class in every respect. Good horses are quickly noticed; they are the main spoke in the wheel of success. Woodstock and the surrounding country can show good stock of all descriptions. If you will come to the exhibition in September you can see for yourself, for there will be an exhibition that will prove interesting and profitable to everyone, and the prospect is it will beat anything held in the past.

Mr. Caldwell, of Northampton, had new box honey on May 20th.

David Gibson, Northampton, has taken the Sentinel for 55 years. In the farming line Mr. Gibson raises 125 tons hay, 1000 bushels oats, 200 barrels potatoes, 250 barrels turnips and 50 bushels wheat. They employ from 15 to 20 men the year through; the stock consists of 23 to 30 head of cattle and some six to ten horses. Mr. Gibson keeps the post office—four mails a week. Telephone wires are being placed on the east side of the river; it will be very convenient for everyone; Mr. Gibson expects to have a telephone in his office.
