Beginning on the 2nd March at Toronto, the Ontario Spring Stallion Show will open. Here will be gathered the choice breeding horses, both stallions and mares of light and heavy breeds, from all parts of Ontario. On the evenings of the 2nd and 3rd, addresses will be given by Hon. John Dryden, W. S. Spark, Canterbury, Eng., R. Ness Howick, Quebec, F. W. Hodson, J. H. Grisdale and Dr. Rutherford, Ottawa.

On Monday, March 7th, the first session of the National Association of Canadian Stock Breeders will open in the City Hall, Ottawa, and continue during the week. The same day the Central Canada Horse Show will open, and simultaneously the Eastern Ontario Winter Fair and Poultry Show.

ditional by explanations of the awards in the ring and through lectures by the experts in attendance. There will also be an auction sale of stock at the Fair buildings during the week. The National Convention of Stock Breeders will take up a number of very important subjects, among them the questions of establishing Canadian National Records for all breeds of live stock, the regulations which should govern the importation of all kinds of stock into Canada, the extension of our foreign markets for stock, the advisability of developing a dead meat trade and the regulations which should govern our horse breeding interests (the licensing of service stallions, etc.).

Plans to protect the wool grower and the honest woolen manufacturer against shoddy competition will be discussed and every woolen manufacturer in Canada is invited to send a representative.

Other matters of importance will also come up. It is to be hoped that the Maritime Provinces will be well represented at the convention so that our special live stock interests may receive due attention. All Live Stock Associations receiving Government aid, Agricultural Societies that have paid \$300. in prizes in 1903, Farmers' Institutes or Associations, or a Grange that have 100 members or more, can send two representatives who when accredited will have voting powers. Everyone interested in the subjects to be discussed is invited to attend.
