Dr. Kirkpatrick's Book Highly Recommended.

The Editor of the *Canadian Magazine*, in the July edition of that periodical, gives a list containing a score of the best books for summer reading. The authors include Winston Churchill, Charles G. D. Roberts, F. Marion Crawford, Robert Barr and W. A. Fraser. In the list we notice "Tales of the St. John River," by Dr. E. S. Kirkpatrick. This is certainly a proof of the excellence of the work. To be ranked with such able writers as above mentioned is a high compliment to Dr. Kirkpatrick, whose literary venture seems quite successful.

SCHOOL OF METHODS.

Particulars re School of Methods at Mount Allison for Sunday school workers and parents:—

The school will meet at Sackville from the 4th to the 14th of July. Board and lodging at the Ladies' College. The teacher will be Prof. Hamill, so well known here and undoubtedly the greatest Sunday school teacher in America. Mrs. Hamill, who ranks as a leader among primary workers, will be with him and take charge of the primary work of the program. As we did last year so we are planning for this year to combine real study with recreation. Excursions and various kinds of amusements will be provided. For the ten days the cost of board and lodging will be \$5. If any wish to stay for only a short time the rate will be \$1 per day. In addition to this there will be the registration fee of \$2, making the total cost for the ten days \$7. Excursions rates have been obtained on all railroads and steamboats.

A SAD ENDING.

ALONSO S. WILSON.

Alonso S. Wilson died in November, 1903, at New Hampshire. He was found in March, 1904, in the woods, after being missing some four months. His funeral was held at Mars Hill, June 12th. He was the eldest son of William and Susan Wilson. He was born in Annapolis county, N. S., March 29th, 1869, and came to Maine with his father and mother in the year 1872, and after he came to manhood he went to New Hampshire and was a prudent and saving young man, leaving his parents some seven or eight hundred dollars. He was unmarried. Possibly it will never be known just how he came to his end. He leaves to mourn his demise, father, mother, three brothers, five sisters, and a number of relatives in Mars Hill and Nova Scotia. His funeral sermon was preached by the writer, C. H. Orser, at the Union church, Mars Hill, from the text found in John, 13th chap., 31-32 verses. The large congregation present bespoke the sympathy and friendship of the community for the family bereaved, and we hope for their consolation and happiness that the son is better off in the great home above, where they shall meet again in the near future.

CARNIVAL NEWS.

The carnival is to be one of the greatest celebrations Woodstock has ever witnessed. On the morning of the twelfth at 10.30 the parade will form on Elm Street. All floats from the south side of the bridge will reach Elm St. by way of Green. The route of the procession is as follows:—Elm to Main, up Houlton Hill, in Broadway, up Main, up Connell, up Green, down Chapel, up Main, disperse at Elm. Immediately after parade, Prof. E. J. Morrell will give a performance on the tight rope, on the square. At two o'clock there will be races at the park, and a band concert on the square, given by the 67th Regt. Band. In the evening from 7.30 to 9.30 o'clock there will be another concert during which time Prof. Morrell will give his second performance on the rope, and immediately after there will be a grand illumination and band concert on the river. The morning of the thirteenth will witness a great baseball struggle between the Colts and the Fredericton Tartars. At 12.30 Prof. Morrell will do stunts in the air once more, and the greatest racing the track has ever seen will be put on by Gallagher Bros. A band will discourse sweet music on the square. In the evening another band concert as well as Prof. Morrell's final performance will take place. The carnival will end with a grand torchlight parade one mile in length. A special prize of five dollars is offered for the best illuminated and decorated float, canoe or boat on the river.

A BIG CATCH.

A party consisting of Messrs. Kyle, Churchill, Palmer and Dr. Kierstead returned a few days ago from a fishing trip to the Miramichi waters. In four days they hooked 1240 fine trout, some weighing three pounds.

Facts About Canada's Militia and Defence.

Canada has a militia force of 40,000. These can be expanded to a war strength of 100,000 as Canada's first line of defence. Provision has recently been made for the raising of a second line of defence of 100,000 when needed. Canada has 300 Rifle Associations, with 22,000 enrolled members. Canada's Militia Department costs two-and-a-half millions a year. Canada has 600 Mounted Policemen, costing half a million annually. They patrol an area as large as Europe.

They are subdivided into 80 posts, scattered from Hudson Bay to the Rocky Mountains, and from the United States boundary to the Arctic Ocean. The farthest north post is on Herschell's Island, in the Arctic Ocean. Canada will fortify St. John, N. B., and Vancouver.

Canada sent 8,372 men to South Africa during the Boer War. Of this number, 224 died and 252 were wounded. Of this number, 597 belonged to Strathcona's Horse.

Canada expended \$2,830,965 in sending the 8,372 men to South Africa.

Facts About Religious Denominations in Canada.

Canada's census specifies 45 different denominations. Canada has over 8,000 priests and ministers.

The Catholic Church has 2,500 priests, Methodists 2,000 ministers, Presbyterians 1,600, Anglicans 1,500, Baptists 600.

There are 2,229,600 Roman Catholics in Canada.

There are 2,936,696 Protestants in 14 denominations in Canada.

There are 16,000 Jews in Canada. There are 10,000 members of the Salvation Army in Canada.
