**Prohibitive Power of Prohibition in Japan.**

In the February Outlook we noted with great interest an article from the pen of the Right Rev. Chas. H. Brent, D. D., Bishop of the Philippine Islands, in regard to Japan and her people. In the course of this article Dr. Brent says:

"Prohibition does prohibit in Japan as far as opium is concerned. The law is so rigid that it is not easy to get opium even for medical uses, and for no other purpose may it be had. It is not extravagant to say that the only vicious use of the drug in the Empire (Formosa not included) is among the eight thousand Chinese resident in the principal parts, and apparently but few of these succeed in smuggling it in. It is an interesting phase of the opium law that not merely the sale or purchase, but even the possession of this forbidden drug is penalized; a person having in his house an opium 'layout' or the drug in any form except under medical orders, is liable to punishment."

Of even greater interest to us at this present juncture is the statement that cigarette smoking was becoming so prevalent in the Flowery Kingdom among the young, that a law was enacted which forbade boys under nineteen to smoke. Dr. Brent pertinently adds "and this law appears to accomplish its end."

## Awakened and Organized Methodism.

It is not new for us to look on the Methodist Church, if not indeed as an avowed ally, at least as a strong sympathizer in our warfare against rum, but to-day we clasp the hand of Canadian Methodism as an organized whole in this fight of the age against the powers of distilled damnation and darkness. Hand clasps of that nature are not new to us, for we are not alone in the fight by any means, but Canadian Methodists have furnished us an object lesson for rejoicing, that we trust will soon be emulated by others, or all of the great Christian denominations in our land.

What does it mean to us to have all Methodism, with its one hundred thousand members, an organized whole with us in this conflict? We women can boast of numbers and zeal, but Methodism has to-day what we lack—votes. And with a foundation and organization that has nobly stood the tension of time for well nigh two centuries, manned with fifteen hundred devout ministers, into whose hands has now been placed, not the mere passive opportunity, but an obligatory call as clear as their ordination, to organize their charges to meet and do battle with this foe to humanity and Christianity while there is a vestige left to combat.

Although it is now over a year since Temperance and moral reform was adopted as an obligatory part of the work of Canadian Methodism it is a regrettable fact that many circuits have let so much time elapse without lining up their forces to do battle with a foe that is ever on the alert. May we express the hope that 1904 will see every circuit and charge fall "into line" in this noble endeavor to exterminate the liquor traffic with its attendant train of evils.

## BELGIUM.

In Belgium the tax on spirits has been increased, and at the same time the tax on tea has been removed, with the object of encouraging tea as a beverage. In Holland a league has been formed to fight the use of spirits. It aims at legislation, but for the present it is doing personal work by posting agents at the doors of public houses to urge the patrons not to enter.

## FIRST PIANO MAKER.

It was a harpsichord maker, Cristofori, in the employ of the Duke of Tuscany, who in 1711 made the first successful piano. As curator of Ferdinand de Medici he had a splendid collection of Belgian, French and Italian instruments to look after, and this undoubtedly aided him, though the model was so crude that the inventor could never have dreamed a monument would ever be erected in his memory. There are only two grand pianofortes of Cristofori in existence.

One decorated in gold and Chinese figures is in Florence, and the other is in the Crosby-Brown collection in the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Three documents attest the authenticity of this last instrument, which was purchased from Signor Diego Martelli.

From this feeble beginning a long list of names could be mentioned of men who helped perfect the piano. But factories alone could never have achieved without loyalty to encourage and virtuosos to play. Frederick the Great ordered five pianos for his palace, where they can be seen at the present day. Marie Antoinette was a patron of the art, and Clementi in England and Mozart in Germany introduced the instruments, so it became a part of life. It was in Pleyel's concert room that Chopin played, and our later firms have brought out a long list of artists—Joseffy, Paderewski and others.
