In view of the near approach of federal election it is interesting to glance over the list of prominent men on the opposition side in the present house in order that a fair comparison may be made between the material now on the treasury benches, and the alternative timber possessed by the conservative party. In a general way it may be stated that never since confederation has the conservative party, or for that matter, any party, had so few men of really first rate ability as is now the case with his majesty's loyal opposition. Certain it is that the leader himself is a man of moderate ability, fairly skilful in debate and gentlemanly in his manner, but wholly without the magnetic personality of some of his predecessors. Mr Borden is of course a man to be reckoned with, and although he devotes himself studiously to the work falling to his lot, cannot be classed as more than a safe man. Brilliancy does not enter into his makeup.
