A Portfolio for Carleton County.

It is quite probable that within a few weeks or months at most there will be at least a couple of vacancies in the Provincial executive. When the premier comes to select new colleagues in the government it will be necessary for him to choose the most capable men in the legislature, having due regard to the section of the Province each represents. It is quite remarkable that the counties along the upper St John, ever staunch in their support of the administration and comprising such a large and important part of the province, have had so little representation in the executive. It cannot be said that this neglect has been due to any lack of ability shown by the men who have represented this section. They have been quite the equal of their confreres, and it cannot be any fault of theirs that this part of the province has had so little voice in the cabinet.

At the present time the three counties in this section give the government five out of seven seats. It is surely no more than right that representation in the executive be no longer delayed. Of the five from these parts supporting the government, no person will deny the fact that Mr Wendell P Jones is the natural leader. He is a man yet young in years, in fact the junior of most members of the house, but his ability and natural qualifications for leadership are unquestioned. A practising barrister of several years standing, and personally a most estimable gentleman, no more popular selection could be made.

The people of Carleton and other up-river counties expect their claims to be granted. That the premier will not disappoint them is the earnest wish of all. There seems not the slightest reason for any other course.

Scott Act Agitation.

An effort will be made to secure a more vigorous enforcement of the Scott Act in the coming year than was the case under the old council. For some days an agitation has been going on tending towards the appointment of Mr Colpitts as inspector for the town. The way the law reads it will take four councillors to remove Inspector Kelly, and it is said these can scarcely be found. At any rate the matter will come up Monday evening, when some interesting events will likely transpire. Some people who profess to know, claim there will be no change in the official, but he will be instructed to go ahead and prosecute with vigor. There is considerable doubt regarding just what may happen, as one or two members of the board, whose votes will decide the matter, are keeping their opinions to themselves, which is perhaps the wisest course.

KEEP IT DOWN.

Mayor Lindsay has a splendid opportunity to prove himself the trusted guardian of the public welfare. There is a section in the act of incorporation limiting the overdraft to \$5000. When it gets beyond that figure no cheques should be issued for any service whatsoever. We trust the new incumbent of the chair will withhold his signature until the debit bank balance is within the limit allowed by legislation.

Solicitor Gen. McKeown Chosen.

At a largely attended convention of the liberal party in St John, last evening, Hon. Harrison Andrew McKeown was nominated as the liberal candidate in succession to Hon. A. G. Blair. The by-election will be held on February 16. Hon Mr McKeown's acceptance will vacate the portfolio of solicitor general, and his seat in the local house. It is not known who will be his opponent. A. W. Macrae and others are mentioned as probable candidates.

WANDERERS WIN.

A fair sized audience saw the Wanderers take the Veterans into camp Thursday night by the close score of 2 to 1. The game was fast and furious, and in doubt until time was up. For the first few minutes, play was confined to the Veterans' territory, and some hot stops were made by Estabrooks. G Connell got the rubber and made a dash for the other end. He and H Drysdale made some furious shots, but the Wanderer defence was like a stone wall. Finally McKendrick, who had been eating up everything that came his way, let one go by and first blood was scored by the Veterans. This only put more vim into their opponents, and F Drysdale neatly evened the score shortly after. Half time was called without further tallying.

The second half was a good exhibition. Both sides were out to win. F Drysdale on a difficult shot, once more put the puck through the Veterans' goal posts. This proved to be the final score, leaving the youngsters winners by the narrowest possible margin. A feature of the game was the number of times Smith and Drysdale collided. Somebody went down every time, good and hard at that.

The Wanderers feel justly elated over their victory. It must be said to the credit of the losers that they were somewhat out of practice. Don Nicholson was referee. Chas McKenney, armed with three chronometers, kept time to the satisfaction of all.

Marysville promises to be the runners up in the race, with the St John Neptunes right on their trail.

Tuesday evening the pick of the Orioles and Wellingtons will go up against a combination from St Stephen. Our young players are not slow, and may be depended upon to give their guests an interesting hour on the ice. A good crowd should turn out and encourage the boys who are trying to revive the sport. Local lumps may have a chance to expand too. More unlikely things have happened.
