As I see pieces in other papers of camps I thought I would tell you how we are getting along up here. Our camp is built on Clyde Brook, eighteen miles from Riley Brook; our cook room is 22x24, and the sleeping part is 21x28.

Our cook, Joe McCattin, is so well known on these waters, and by all who ever worked in Hale's concern, that there is no need for me to sound his praises, as he is the best cook on the Tobique waters, and can cook anything that I ever saw cooked, and is a jolly good fellow amongst the boys.

Our clerk, Mick White, is a jolly fellow and can supply wants of the boys from his well filled wagon for a price as low as any of the stores in Woodstock.

Our boss, Sam Merritt has fifty-seven men to handle and he knows how to do it as well as any of them; he knows where to find the spruce for the boys to get, and how to get it at cheap cost.

We have four span of horses here yarding; our leading team is handled by Peter Gallagher who can yard as many spruce as the best of them and who don't fear to buck up against any man on the Tobique in line of spruceing.

Orlando Wheeler handles the ribbons over a nice team and can put up the logs in good style to be sure.

John Dunbar controls the straps over a very fine span of grays and he is the boy who can pile logs too. He is a jolly good fellow and well liked by all who know him.

Tommie O'Donald handles the straps over a span of Island lads and Tommie is doing as good as any of the boys.

An accident occurred the other day to one of our boys, Charlie White, who while chopping a tree got caught by the leg and remained fast until Jack McCarty came to his relief, which was one hour.

We have some light weights here in our camp and we have men here clear from Port Arthur from the very seat of the war and men who are not afraid to take a hold to work either.

Sandie, our fly catcher and chain lifter, had bad luck as he swallowed, or it is thought he has, four mice as he lay asleep, last night (16th inst).

Now, dear Editor, I will stop writing and if these few lines don't find their way to the waste basket you will perhaps hear from me again before spring.

Hodgdon, Me.

A wonderful rock is situated on Mr Porter's farm near his buildings three or four rods from the barn. This rock is a very peculiar one indeed. It rests on a ledge and by the appearance it is on a point. This rock weighs twenty tons. They call it the "rolling stone." There has been hundreds to visit it from all parts and they have taken samples to other parts of the country.

Mr Porter has some two hundred and fifty acres of land; one hundred and fifty acres of valuable timber land, well wooded at that; good buildings and well planned for convenience and comfort; one large barn, 90 feet by 41, and a large shed the same length. Mr Porter has buildings of all descriptions needed on the farm and everything is in its place. The farming machinery is housed in good shape; just what every farmer should do. Mr Porter has splendid stock all in good shape and well taken care of—the appearance shows that. He raised some 1600 barrels of potatoes, 30 tons of hay, 200 bushels of oats, 200 barrels of turnips.

It is quite evident the west part of Hodgdon is the best, both in privilege and soil. There are two saw mills, one grist mill, two shingle mills, a lath mill, one carding mill, one millinery shop, one blacksmith and sled making shop combined, a post office, two churches, two school houses, two stores well filled to supply the wants of the citizens. They support a preacher and a doctor. By the appearance of the soil and lay of the land the forest consisted of maple and birch, with a good sprinkle of basswood elm and ash. To support this forest means deep soil, which is very productive for farming. They have good buildings, large barns and well filled, good stock, plenty of beef, pork, butter and cheese. Truly the town of Hodgdon is a prosperous or progressive town in every respect; good cooks and splendid housekeepers.

One improvement in the east part of Hodgdon is a farmers' bell, with rope attached, which is very convenient. A person can read the SENTINEL, fry pancakes, and if necessary rock the cradle, with one jerk of the rope and the men to dinner and spin yarn too, I do not mean street yarns, but yarn made of good wool.

One thing lacking and that is a railroad from Danforth to Houlton by the way of Forest City, Orient, Amity, Cary and through the prosperous town of Hodgdon. These towns assisted the B & A and they have a perfect right to a railroad from Danforth to Houlton.

Houlton is the most prosperous town east of Bangor or Boston and if any person or persons don't believe it just step into the "Square" some pleasant day and see for themselves. Not only that but Houlton has a good number of stores all well filled, especially Mr Richards and Foxes and they are equal to any in Bangor or other cities in Maine.

Mrs Cunningham of Canterbury is visiting her brother and friends here and vicinity. Mr Hand has a large store at Hodgdon Corner, so called, a very central place where four roads meet or cross. The store is well filled with groceries of all description, first class at that. He is doing quite a business in the meat line. There are six places in the town of Hodgdon where four roads meet or cross, all which is four miles square and finger boards to point the strangers in the right direction or to a certain place.
