Important Case in Court.

Before his honor Judge Carleton, in chambers, on Wednesday morning the case of John Kennedy versus J N W Winslow, Frederick H Hale and J T Allan Dibblee was begun. This was an action on a note. F B Carvell, M. P. appeared for the plaintiff and A B Connell, K. C. for the defendants. The first witness called was Miss B K Dibblee, who swore that on the 7th day of September last she presented for payment at the Bank of Nova Scotia a note for \$165.75, due five months after April 29th, 1903, made in favor of J H Thompson and bearing the signatures of the three defendants. The answer was "no funds".

Daniel A. Grant, manager of the Woodstock Carriage factory, was next called. He identified signatures of defendants. Said John Kennedy is present owner of note. He (Grant) sold note to Kennedy, and received face value in cash. Cross examined by Mr Connell, witness swore that he had purchased note from J H Thompson. Had given him a carriage, sleigh and a certain amount of repair work for note. He (Grant) had asked advice of several parties concerning the note after it had come into his possession. On re-examination witness said defendant Dibblee always had been willing to pay his share of the note and was still willing. Defendant Hale before the last election said he would pay his share too, but had since declined.

The plaintiff rested his case here. The defence put J H Thompson on the stand. He swore to selling certain quantities of liquor to defendants, and took notes in payment. Note in question was a renewal of an original given for liquor.

Cross examined by Mr Carvell, witness said liquor was purchased during the election campaign of 1900. Fred Hale had told him to go ahead and give what liquor was required, and he (Hale) would see that the bills were paid. The other defendants gave orders to certain parties for liquor, which was delivered on presentation of the orders. He had sold Hale and the other defendants a great deal of liquor in that election, for which he had taken notes in payment.

J N W Winslow was next called. Had talked with Grant two or three times concerning note. On the first occasion told Grant note was no good. Grant had told him (Winslow) that Hale had refused to accept a draft to cover the note.

J T A Dibblee remembered talking to Grant several times about the note. Had told Grant not to take it.

J Chipman Hartley, called by Mr Connell, knew nothing of the liquor trade with Thompson. Had never seen the note. Remembered talking with Grant about a note. Told him ordinarily the defendants would be good for anything they signed.

Mr Connell here placed in evidence a copy of the Canada Gazette dated July 5th, 1879, wherein is a proclamation bringing into force in Carleton County the provisions of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878. He also moved to amend defendants' general plea by adding special plea that note was given for intoxicating liquors and therefore no good.

Mr Carvell in rebuttal called John Kennedy who swore he bought note from Grant in December 1903. Paid him face value in money. Did not then know note was given for liquor. Thought note was good.

Dan A Grant recalled, swore that any conversation he had with Dibblee about note was after note had been purchased from Thompson, and also any talk with Winslow was after and not before the purchase.

This concluded the evidence. Judgment was reserved.

THE TOWN ELECTION.

We are authorized to state that Councillor Albert E Jones is in the field as a candidate for the mayoralty in opposition to Mayor Lindsay who is seeking a second term. The electors are well acquainted with Coun Jones, and we believe he will take a very heavy vote, judging by his past contests whenever he ran for the council.

There are also six candidates in the field for the Council. They are Couns Stevens and Fisher and Messrs W B Nicholson, Alexander Henderson, James S McManus and John S Leighton, jr. We do not know of any others who are positively in the field.

JAMES KELLY DEAD.

Nearly everybody in town knew "Jimmy" Kelly, an old gentleman who formerly lived on a farm near Plymouth, and who recently came to town to board at the Brunswick. Monday morning he was found dead in his bed. An inquest was held at which a verdict of death from heart failure was rendered. Mr. Kelly's wife died about two years ago. He was famous as a dealer in horses.

School Concert.

The pupils of Miss Harmon's school gave a concert in the Orange Hall on Tuesday evening. A large number of grown people attended the function. The program was composed of vocal, instrumental and literary selections. Miss Maude Henderson was accompanist. Over \$22 dollars was realized which will be devoted to school purposes. Everybody is loud in praise of Miss Harmon and her bright pupils.
