TWO HARVEST EXCURSIONS

The Canadian Pacific Railway announce two Harvest Excursions, tickets for which will be on sale from points in Nova Scotia East of New Glasgow, September 10th and 23rd, from other points in Nova Scotia and from points in New Brunswick, September 17th and 24th.

THE WOOLLEN MILLS.

The woollen mills have thirty-five per cent of protection against all other countries, excepting Great Britain. In the case of Great Britain there was until recently a preference of 33 per cent, which made the net duty 23 per cent; but, in response to efforts made by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and other corporations and individuals, the Laurier Government fixed the tariff recently at a minimum of thirty per cent. If you want to buy a piece of British cloth now, worth a hundred dollars, you are required to pay a hundred and thirty dollars for it; while if you bought it in the United States and Germany, you would still be required to pay a hundred and thirty five dollars for what should cost you only a hundred. With all their past and present coddling, however, some of the woollen mills are closing down, and you would think, to listen to their complaints, that they were very hardly done by. The truth is, however, that even if their own destructive competition had not killed them off long ago, no tariff that public opinion would now sanction could save the woollen mills from disaster. If the Dominion government to-day furnished them with funds to resume work, and a tariff of fifty per cent to protect them from the competition of 'shoddy', they would perish all the same. There are several reasons to prove it. One great trouble all along in this small market, with no outlet for surplus, has been that the fluctuations of fashion have imposed a caution in buying raw stuff, and a hand to mouth system, that causes delay in production, induces cancells because of the late delivery, disappointment to customers, and loss of profit from subsequent clearing of stock. There is also, and always has been, a loss because of variety of orders and the small quantity of each

pattern ordered. A traveller will send in orders to a mill for perhaps twenty to fifty different patterns, but the quantity ordered of each so small as to leave no margin of profit.

AT SEA IN A BIG BOTTLE.

Last week three persons confined in a metal ball eight feet in diameter, were dropped overboard from a steamer about midway between Yarmouth and the Hook of Holland.

The metal ball was the life-saving globe invented by Captain Doenvig, a Norwegian mariner, and the three occupants were Herr Elvstad of the journal 'Orebladet'; Herr Ludvigsen, of the 'Kysten,' both of Christiania, and Herr Jakobsen, chief officer of the Norwegian steamer 'Ragni,' which consigned them to the North Sea. Strapped securely in the globe, the adventurers took a farewell of Capt Steinert, of the 'Ragni.' The sphere entered the water with a tremendous splash, and for a moment disappeared beneath the surface of the waves only to bob up again like a cork. Pending its reappearance on the surface of the water there was a breathless two or three seconds, then the round cover of the buoy reappeared, and from its depths was heard a muffled cheer. The voyagers anchored their globe, and, according to a pre-arrangement commenced to cook their first meal of ham and eggs.

They carried two months' provision and a hundred and twenty gallons of water, and the cargo included guns, fishing lines, cameras, and scientific instruments. Emergencies are provided for by three anchors, also signal flags denoting 'Report all well' and 'Require help.' The 'Doenvig' globe is made of sheet iron, rather flattened at the bottom, and of thicker metal below, so that it shall sail upright. It is provided with a funnel, which can be thrust through one of the three openings or windows for the purpose of ventilation, and which can also be used as a mast to carry a sail.

Further, the globe is equipped with a movable keel, a rudder, and the means of working a pair of oars. Under the deck, which is a foot below the water-line, are four galvanized tanks holding fresh water, and under the bench which runs along the side of the craft is a store of tinned provisions. The buoy carries a Norwegian flag by day and a bright lantern by night.
