Suffragists Visit Kaiserin.

The Empress recently received at the Schloss twenty-one members of the International Council of Women. Mrs May Wright Sewall of Indianapolis, in an interview after the reception, said that throughout the conversation, which lasted an hour and a half, the Kaiserin gave the impression that she entirely sympathized with the progressive movement of women throughout the world.

To Mrs Sewall the Empress said that so long as she had only sons her interest in the woman's movement was casual, but now that she had a daughter growing up to womanhood she was thoroughly interested in the question.

Miss Susan B Anthony was another member of the delegation received by the Empress. She said afterward: "The Kaiserin was more than gracious. I was third in line when she saw me and asked me to sit down. She expressed great interest in my work. I answered that I hoped Emperor William would take as much interest in the woman's movement as he did in manufactures. 'Tell him,' I said, 'I hope he will aid in granting to the women of Germany the same rights as are enjoyed by the women of America.' The Kaiserin smiled.

"Our reception by her Majesty will be a great impetus to the woman's movement, for we well know what royal encouragement in Germany means to a cause."

Most Popular Bar-Tender in Montreal.

The Presse having recently opened a competition in which an excursion to the St Louis World's Fair is offered to the most popular man in different branches, and "bar-tenders" being included in one of the sections, Mr Denis R Perrault writes to the Journal giving his opinion as to what constitutes the most popular bartender. He says: "In my opinion the most popular bar-tenders are those who contribute the most to fill our penitentiaries, our prisons, our lunatic asylums, our houses of refuge; those who contribute the most to demoralize our city, to destroy the happiness of our homes, to impoverish families, to bring to misery unfortunate orphans and poor widows whose father and husband was a drunkard, the client of those popular bar-tenders."

The Primitive Baptist annual meeting convened at Hartland, July 2nd, at 10 a. m. Ministers present—C H Orser, G E Orser, S W Bannison, M P Orser, D E Brooks, G A Giberson, N Kilcollens; licentiates, E London, H Giberson, A Dalbeck; Rev H Hartt, Christian; Revs J Perry, A J Prosser, Free Baptist.

At 2 p. m. there was preaching by W Kilcollens, and many took part in the services. At conference meeting many spoke; at the close of the meeting the sacrament was administered and many partook. At a business meeting, at 7.30, reports were read from the churches.

Sunday at 9 a. m. the meeting was opened with prayer lasting one hour. At 10 a. m. preaching by C H Orser; a large number took part; also at the same hour Revs Bannison and Dalbeck held a meeting in the Free Baptist house. At 2.30 p. m. preaching by G E Orser; at 7.30 p. m. preaching by H Hartt. Very large congregations all day.

On Monday at 9 a. m. there was a business meeting. Roll call. Ministers and messengers answered the same. Reports of committees read. The election of officers resulted as follows: C H Orser re-elected chairman; G A Giberson, assistant; M P Orser, clerk; D E Brooks, assistant; executive committee elected. Rev H Hartt of Monticello, Me, had a letter from the 'Christian' denomination and was received as a minister. E London was licensed for one year as were also H Giberson, J Sprague and A Dalbeck.

At 1.30 again met and received the reports of the treasurer and auditor. The October quarterly meeting will be held at Mars Hill, Me.; January quarterly at Windsor; March quarterly at Caribou, Me. The annual meeting in July will be held at Canterbury Station. Rev D E Brooks was appointed to attend the annual meeting in N. S. in September.

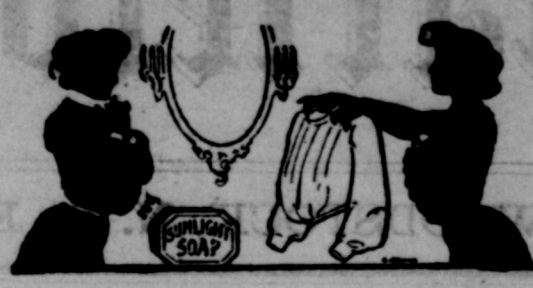
