Liquor at the World's Fair.

The front page July 14th issue of Voice gives us an unwelcome glimpse at the "other side of the picture" at the Exposition in St. Louis. The New Voice says:—

"The entire Exposition is hardly more than a gigantic beer preserve. Many of the best attractions are hidden behind beer halls. Beer and wine exhibits, all out of proportion to the legitimate industries, appear everywhere, in nearly every portion of the great show."

The New Voice accounts for this foul stream which flows through the Fair grounds—and which is sure to bring ruin and sorrow in its wake—from the fact that when the promoters of the Fair first laid their plans the St. Louis brewers made an immense contribution to the managers (something like \$400,000). This money was given with the explicit understanding that opportunity would be offered for them to get "their money back," and that right of way would be granted them. Right royally are the managers fulfilling their part of this nefarious contract, for we are told that to-day it requires nearly 2,000 bar-tenders and waiters to serve the crowds who frequent the beer halls, drinking bazaars and restaurants whose chief sale is beer.

Is not this a terrible comment upon men whose presumably high standing in a community would warrant us in supposing that they would more carefully guard the well-being of the Fair's patrons, than to thrust temptation so near them that only the strong are capable of resisting. If "the weak brother perish, for whom Christ died," at whose door think you will the responsibility lie?

ENGLAND.

The English people are in the throes of a conflict with the drink foe—now the temperance people triumph and again the liquor forces re-assert themselves. The encouraging part of the campaign seems to be that conscience is working, and that more people each year are alarmed at the encroachments of the traffic and its menacing power. The National Advocate of New York, makes the following statement:—

"The number of teetotal mayors in England and Wales, as far as we have been able to ascertain, is over fifty, and to this must be added the fifty three provosts of the Scottish municipalities, making a splendid total. Alderman Clements, J P, is mayor of Henley for the fifth time, and it is interesting to learn that for thirteen years past the town of Luton has had a succession of teetotal mayors, not one of whom has provided intoxicants during his term of office."

"The Daily Paper, Mr Stead's newest journalistic venture, has published the results of a census of Sunday frequenters of London grog-shops. Paddington is one of the great centers of the big city, containing 142,690 residents. On the Sunday the census was taken 31,331 were found in the churches and 122,175 in the grog-shops. More than 10,000 of the latter were children and 28,118 were women. Think of that going on Sunday after Sunday—nearly four times as many in the house of the devil as in the house of God! Think of the proportion of women and children among those found in the saloons! The facts are appalling. No wonder that the British Weekly says that drink is eating away the life of the nation."
