The Bonus Question.

The negotiations between Mr. A. Wilmot Hay's company and the town council are proceeding smoothly. The vouchers for the cost of the present plant have been presented to the council. We shall be very glad to hear that the total of the same is more than the required amount. Nothing would give us greater pleasure than to be assured that the company's investment represents an even greater sum. Mr. Hay in a letter to the Press, sets forth his side of the question. The publication of the accounts, which we believe is favored by the company, will set the public at rest in the matter.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The liberals are likely to make a selection at an early date. Messrs. Armstrong, Todd, Mills and Gillmor are mentioned. Perhaps Mr. Armstrong will be the one chosen. The good fight he put up three years ago in the face of heavy odds demands some recognition. At least one more trial should be given him, particularly in view of the good work for the county accomplished in the past three years by reason of his faithful efforts.
