Parliament will likely prorogue tomorrow. The government was sustained on the last vote by a majority of 42.

Chamberlain declares he is ready for the general election. In the meantime the electors continue to turn down his candidates with unerring regularity.

Woodstock people who have been in St Andrews during the past week include Dr Hand, Hugh Hay, J R Brown, Miss A A Gallagher, Mrs H Judge and E Connor.

Gordon S A Connell has safely arrived in Lethbridge. At Winnipeg he met E H Phillips. The latter has a fine situation in the western metropolis, but rather prefers life in the East.

The transfer of the Connell Foundry, as predicted in our last issue, took place on Saturday. The main stockholders in the new company are George E Phillips, D Munro, J Arch Connell and Raymond Gabel. Others hold smaller amounts. It is understood that about \$40,000 changed hands in the sale.

The Wrapper Factory is now running full time, the Canning Factory is preparing for a big season's operations, more than ordinary activity is felt in nearly all lines, so that idle workmen are hard to find. It is almost impossible to get a man to work for \$1.25 per day, which at one time was counted big wages.
