SENT UP FOR TRIAL.

On Friday of last week Thomas Cammack was committed for trial on October 18th next on charge of murdering William Doherty at Rutherglen on July 17. Walter Cammack, his son, was committed for trial as well. The story of the crime retold by Cammack's wife and two brothers of the murdered man in the examination before Magistrate Dibble.

A new feature was the evidence of Cammack's wife against Walter Cammack. She said that after she had fled from the house from the attack of her husband, a second man, and she said it was Walter Cammack chased her with a club and said he would kill her.

Charles Doherty, brother of the murdered man, testified to seeing a second man outside the house, but could not say it was Walter Cammack.

Wm. H. Elliott, who lived near Doherty's testified that he had heard Walter Cammack say that it would be a good thing if the Doherty's were wiped out of the place.

Deputy Sheriff Foster gave evidence that Thomas Cammack confessed to him that he had shot Wm. Doherty, but he added that his son Walter was not with him. Walter Cammack has protested that he had nothing to do with the murder.

The session of the Supreme Court at which the prisoner will be tried, will be presided over by His Honor Judge Gregory.

RUSSIA'S DESIGNS ON INDIA.

It would appear that recently General Kuropatkin has been devoting much of his time and attention to the subject of how Russia might best invade India, and that he had just completed and forwarded his secret report to the Czar when he was called to take command of the Russian army in the Far East. Just how these things ooze out it is not for us to say, but a London contemporary publishes a very lengthy verbatim report of what Kuropatkin recommended to the Czar. Our contemporary adds that the report was adopted, but laid aside for use at a more convenient season.

Put briefly, Kuropatkin's scheme is, for Russia to march on India with 115,000 men—one army to advance via Merv on Kandahar, and another to march from Samarcand on Kabul. He divides his campaign into three phases. First he would advance through Turkestan, and end that phase by the taking of Herat and the holding of all the north of Afghanistan from Herat to Badakshan. Then he would pause for two years, during which period he would either thoroughly conquer or win over the Afghans. His second phase would be an advance in two columns with Kandahar and Kabul as objectives. From there India would be invaded by the Bolan and Khyber passes. To provide against any rearward attack Kuropatkin recommends that Persia be conciliated to the fullest extent. This course he thinks would also enable the right division of the army to advance partially through Persian territory. The third phase comprises the crossing of the Khyber and Bolan passes to India. Kuropatkin thinks that by the time the Russians reach Kandahar and Kabul the British will have lost influence with the natives of India and that Britain would be faced with a revolt, instigated and supported by Russia.

This is no hasty passing thought on the part of Kuropatkin, but a matured scheme "after a lengthy survey of the northwest frontier of India," and one that has been fully considered and approved by the Russian authorities. It may account for Russia's recent attempts to Russinize Northern Persia. But it may account for more. If news of this lengthy survey and report has reached the Press in London, it may also have reached the Viceroy in India, and led to his recent determined stand against Russia's intermeddling in Persia, Tibet and elsewhere in the Far East. That Russia has long cast a covetous eye on India is well known, but it would seem to be developing into a mania.

The rapid growth of cities in the United States is creating a large demand for electric heating and power plant equipment, and there is also a large demand in the export trade.

Band concerts on the top of school buildings in New York is a new feature of the \$1 play grounds and 39 vacation schools opened this week for the summer. The concerts will be given twice a week.

Crop experts estimate that the wheat yield in the United States will be equal to recent years, and might surpass last year's by 10,000,000 bushels.

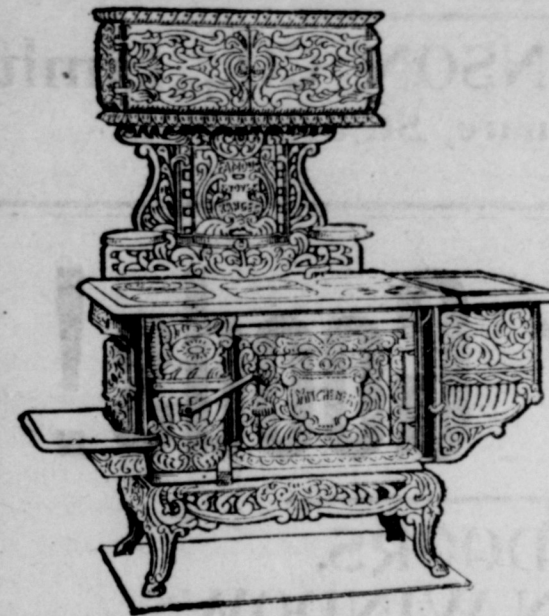

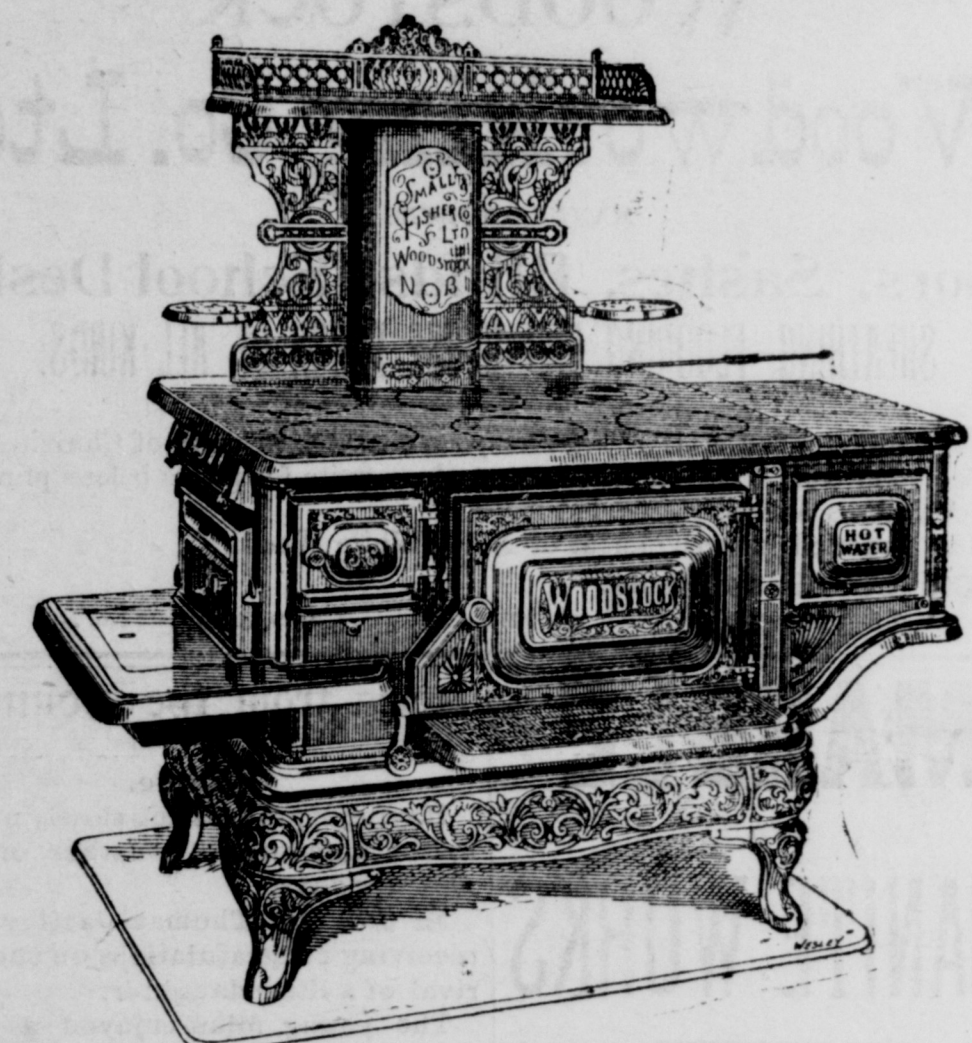

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel: The last act in the Gee tragedy was enacted when George Gee was laid to rest in the burying ground above Bath on Saturday.

Mr. Editor, we must give you credit for not casting slurs against this fair county for it has been the first hanging here, but we cannot say that of the St. John Sun, for from the beginning it has been casting its slurs and it could not finish up till it cast reflections on his funeral. We are all aware it was an awful crime, but St.

John has had lots of them and this is the first for this county.

The Sun has told an absolute falsehood when it said that there was a case of liquor with the remains when it came from Woodstock. The two young men that hauled the body do not touch liquor and, if they did, that would be no one's business, but they are above reproach, for no one who knows them would believe the scandal as they are civil, upright, young men. When people are trying to be people while in trouble, we do not think it is right to through slurs at them. Their father runs a saw mill. He closed his mill down and with his two sons started with a team for Woodstock to haul the remains of George Gee home. When people are in trouble, sickness or death, there is no one that will do more for them in this part of the country than Amos Demerchant and his family.

We think, Mr. Editor, that it is near time the editor of the Sun would stop casting slurs on this county. Outside of the murder, George Gee had no enemies here, for he was a civil boy—and that is the cause of there being so many at his funeral and not as the Sun said, to make a hero of him.
