ANOTHER LULL IN THE WAR.

This last week there has been another lull comparatively, in the war in the Far East—at least operations were neither so active nor so destructive as in the week before. Yet the Japanese were far from idle. They claim to have now driven a wedge into the very centre of Port Arthur's forts. After three days of continuous bombardment (which caused extensive destruction to the Shojusan, Nairusan, and Keekwan forts) the Japanese assaulted Shojusan, carried the approaches to that height, and entrenched themselves under the glacis of the forts. Thereafter they made an assault upon Keekwan fort, fought their way to the lower parapet, and held their ground stubbornly in the face of Russian counter attacks. After being reinforced the Russians charged down on the Japanese, and their positions were taken and retaken twice in a hand to hand conflict; and in course of this Port P, north of the new and old batteries, was also captured by the Japanese.

The Japanese report that everything is proceeding satisfactorily for them about Port Arthur, but experts say that they (the Japanese) will yet have to take both the Antse and Etse mountains before they can compel the Russians to abandon Port Arthur city proper, though it is rumoured that General Stoessel has been compelled to leave the citadel with 10,000 men, and to take refuge in the forts on Tiger's Tail. There are sixteen Russian fighting ships still in Port Arthur harbour. These have never been dismantled, and the sailors are kept on-board—only the small machine guns having been sent ashore; but it is said all the vessels are moved to new anchorages every night, in order to avoid the occasional shells which the Japanese keep dropping into the harbour.

The latest despatch states that the Japanese General Nogi, on hearing from a prisoner that the Russians in Port Arthur garrison were dispirited, and were of opinion that there was no use in prolonging a resistance which could only bring glory to their officers and hardship and death to themselves—sent back the prisoner with a message to that garrison, offering them humane treatment in the event of their surrendering and so saving further useless slaughter. The prisoner returned again, and said that his comrades would send an answer in a few days, but meantime disliked the idea of an unofficial surrender. Meanwhile the activity of the Japanese picks and shovels continues, and they are always advancing their trenches, though lime-stone formations and rocky ground greatly retard their operations. It is rumoured that a Japanese warship was recently sunk off Port Arthur by a mine. On the other hand, five Russian ships have been sunk by Japanese shells.

There appears to be little doing about Mukden, though the armies are facing and almost touching each other. General Linvitch, the new commander of the Russian First Army Corps, has arrived at the front, and is expected to assume command soon. Both armies have recently been largely reinforced, and the Russian line now extends to sixty-five miles. A battle there is daily expected now.—Exchange.

Cost of Presidential Campaign.

Considering the enormous sums spent by both Republicans and Democrats in course of a Presidential campaign in this country it is not surprising that there is a feeling abroad that the matter ought now to be put under legislative control—some measure which would restrain and regulate the collection and disbursement of campaign funds. Beyond the law in this State requiring candidates to lodge statements of their expenditures there is no legislation, State or Federal, which puts a check upon the conduct of State and National Committees, or requiring them to make up and publish a statement of the sums collected and expended. To say the least of it, this is neither satisfactory nor business-like. If the parties were obliged by law to publish within a certain short period after each election an abstract statement of all sums collected and disbursed it would do much to allay those suspicions of corruption which are now only too prevalent.

Experts estimate that in the campaign just closed the Republican and Democratic parties, together, have spent over twenty-two millions, five hundred thousand dollars (\$22,500,000.) This is no random statement. It is known that the Republican National Committee has spent over three million dollars (\$3,000,000), and the Democratic National Committee about two million dollars (\$2,000,000), together five million dollars. Experience has demonstrated that for every dollar spent by the National Committee the State Committee spent four. This year, owing to the stiff fights waged in several States,

the proportion has been increased half a dollar more. Multiplying the five million dollars by four and a half we thus get \$22,500,000 spent by the State Committees alone. To the grand total might be added, it is said, "a large sum spent by candidates who paid their own expenses during costly tours of the State and country."—Scottish American Journal.
