### AN INSIDIOUS SIN.

The one reason why we have to guard against this sin of intemperance with such extraordinary care is the fact that it, of all sins, insinuates itself into the fibres of the nature, and immediately it begins to affect the character. Do not think of it as a robe that may have been slipped over, and when it becomes uncomfortable you will fling it off. It is a garment like that Hercules wore; it is soaked in every thread and fibre with poison and the poison will soon begin to go into your system.

It does not matter how honorable and straightforward a man is before he falls beneath the power of this vice. You are as simple as a child if you expect that in a year after, in that man, the very elements of virtue or of strength will remain. You know that that is true; you know that there are men whose foreheads would once have been mantled with a genuine blush if charged with falsehood; they would deny a fact now and look into your eye. And you know that man will condescend to the low, despicable cunning of a savage; no ingenuity has ever been discovered short of absolute confinement that will restrain that man from ruining himself and he will practice any amount of deceit to obtain the poison which is his destruction. His character begins just simply to crumble away, like the foundation of a house when the water is running beneath it. You cannot depend upon the word of a man who has fallen under the power of vice.

This sin comes into the house like a serpent. We can keep out of any sin; not this one. Poor child, the little fellow that used to sit beside you, who used to nestle against you in the church—you see his face to-night; do you know what he is? He whom you loved, now an outcast. You are silent. What do you propose to do to counteract and destroy this terrible evil? Have you any plan? What do you propose to do to save your children from the power of this vice? How do you propose to save your friends? Are you just going to let him slip? It is worth all your thought, all your trouble, all your pain. If you could rescue one single man or woman, altogether it is just about hopeless, rescue them. Try. If you could rescue one man or woman, it would be the greatest achievement of your life.—Rev. J. ### EXCISE.

We are sorry to read some of the following figures: The quantity of spirits produced during the year was 4,093,603 proof gallons, compared with 3,834,147 proof gallons last year. There were 49,959,153 lbs Indian corn, 4,435,316 lbs malt, 12,035,017 lbs wheat, 475,602 oats, and 1,214,687 gallons used in the production of spirits for the year. There were 168,959,426 cigars consumed, 10,000,000 greater than in the previous year and 24,653,214 lbs of tobacco, more than 3,000,000 greater than in 1902. The quantity of tobacco, wine and spirits consumed per head was greater than in the previous year. The quantity of beer used was less. The figures were .570 spirits; 4.721 beer; .096 wine and 2.542 tobacco; against .796 spirits; 5.102 beer; .90 wine and 2.404 tobacco in 1902.

It is well to cut out these figures or to copy them and keep them where you can easily refer to them. The temperance reformation has not made much progress. May we not say that it has not made any progress during the year? The most interesting incident is the refusal of permission to open a brewery or distillery at Sydney. Public opinion showed wholesome strength in that case.

It seems needful that a reform movement should arise against the use of tobacco. There is something appalling in the consumption of 24,600,000 lbs in one year in Canada. The waste is enormous and the injury to health cannot be slight. Think of 168,000,000 cigars being consumed by our people.

The use of liquor is declared by many people to be innocent. Its abuse, they say, is what is evil. But the trouble with the use of liquor is that it runs so easy to abuse. The abuse of reading, of conversation, of exercise, are all evils, but they are not such evils, nor are they so likely

evils, as the curse of the abuse of liquor. All those who are now guilty of this abuse never intended to go so far when they began. They set out to use it in moderation. Why will young men be so foolish as to think they can use temperately what so many stronger men have been unable to stop short of abusing intemperately?
