## Report of Town Auditors.

In our last issue we took occasion to throw out a gentle reminder to the town council that there was a more expeditious channel for the report of the town auditors to reach the public than by publication along with the treasurer's report in pamphlet form. Our suggestion was to have the report given to the local newspapers. Nearly every home in the town is reached through the agency of the town papers. If this course were followed we felt there would be no unnecessary delay in the report reaching the public. Of course it might be said that the document was at the disposal of the representatives of the town papers to copy and publish the same if they chose, but we took the ground that it was none of our business to go prying into the town accounts. If the council had not sufficient conception of its duty, it was none of the SENTINEL'S business to rush in the breach and demand the document. What we desired was to have the council set itself on record as being in favor of the fullest publicity being given to the report of Messrs. Leighton and Ketchum. We do not think there was any excuse whatever for the flippant remarks made when the SENTINEL article was under discussion. It is well within the knowledge of every member of the council that we are by no means unwilling to devote our space to town affairs, particularly any document that will assist in letting the public know how far in the mire the town's financial standing has been allowed to sink.

It was with some surprise that we learned of the attempt to throw discredit on our motive in asking for publication. The SENTINEL is not under the painful necessity of seeking work in such a manner. The suggestion that we were seeking a chance to swell the town's expenditure comes with very bad grace from the source wherein it was concocted.

## CABINET BUILDING.

The St John Gazette, in a recent issue, takes the ground that Mr. Robertson, one of the local members for the city, would be likely to succeed Hon. A. T. Dunn as surveyor general in the event of a guarantee being given the premier that his reelection would be reasonably sure. We do not think St John would be so utterly regardless of its own interests as to reject one of its members should he appear for re-election consequent upon accepting a portfolio. The electorate in that city is subject to sudden and sweeping changes, yet we could not credit it with being so ungrateful as to reject a cabinet minister. In the event of any great doubt, probably the wiser course would be to ignore the city, and give executive representation to some county where no uncertainty regarding the public approval exists. Carleton, York and Westmorland stand ready to re-elect any member who may be called up higher in the service of his country.

## CREDITABLE WORK.
