TARIFF ON WOOLENS.

The closing down of the Montreal Woolen Mills has given rise to renewed discussion of the tariff question. Manufacturers contend that under the preference they cannot compete with the English mills, while the wholesale houses assert just as confidently that the cause of their failure is due to the use of antiquated machinery and the inferior quality of the goods produced.

One leading woolen manufacturer expresses his sentiments as follows: "I am and always have been totally opposed to any preference to British goods. We should legislate in this country for the benefit of Canadians wholly."

Mr. R. R. Stevenson, of the firm of Stevenson, Blackader & Co., is of the opinion. "Were the government to come to the aid of the mills 40 per cent. straight protection against English competition would be absolutely necessary. The recent slight change in the tariff favoring Canadian woollens is entirely inadequate. Had a duty of 30 per cent. been imposed on English woollens three years ago, the mills would now be in a flourishing condition. They would have been able to compete with the Yorkshire mills, which for the past three years have been flooding the country with their products. Unfortunately this was not done, and in the years which have elapsed the English have tightened their hold upon our markets, and were a 30 per cent. duty imposed now it would be totally inadequate."

Mr. Joseph Horsfall, of the Montreal woolen mill, says: "If we are to exist at all there has got to be a change. This tariff is killing the woolen industry. Conditions are rapidly growing worse; yet at the present time they are unsupportable. The change has got to come quickly, and be of a radical nature."

The above opinions fairly represent the manufacturers' side of the case. That of the trade in general is well set forth in the statement of Mr. Jonathan Hodgson, head of the wholesale firm of Hodson, Sumner & Co., Montreal, who says: "The trouble cannot be attributable to the tariff. It is all owing to the quality of the goods manufactured by these Canadian companies. The English manufacturer has found a way to make his goods more attractive both in style and finish, and it is on this account that they can compete with Canadians on this market. What the Canadian companies must do, if they want our trade, is to improve their plant and put out a greater variety of goods."

In support of this view it may be added that those mills which are modernly equipped and are producing superior goods are not complaining of dull times. A specific duty that would make more difficult the importation of shoddy has been suggested as a remedy for the state of affairs confronting the Montreal Mills.

Chili Sauce.—One-half bushel of tomatoes, six large green peppers and ten large onions. Peel the tomatoes and onions, slicing the latter. Remove the cores and seeds from the peppers and cut into small pieces. Boil the ingredients until soft enough to run through a sieve to fine to allow for the passage of seeds. Place the pulp on to boil again and add to it one-half teaspoonful each of cinnamon, cloves and all-spice, two cups of brown sugar two of vinegar and salt to taste. Boil until of the desired thickness, bottle, seal and keep in a dry place.
