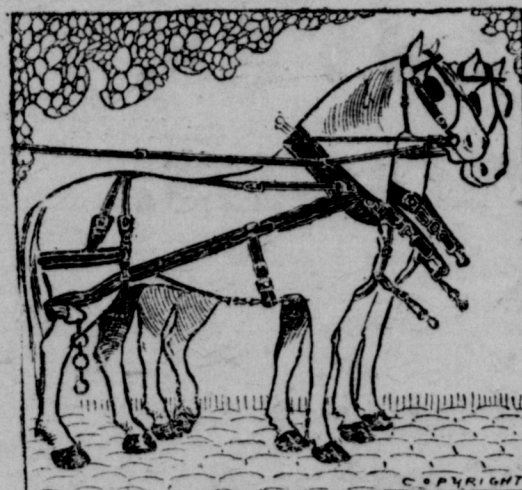

IMPORTANT.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:
Knowing that you take a lively interest in the welfare of the people of our country, for the safety of commerce and especially the lives and health of our citizens, and having made reference to the many train wrecks in both Canada and the United States, which is now attracting the attention of the press of the country as well as the companies and governments that own the railroads and are anxious to discover some plan by which such occurrences may be minimized and thus the lives and property of those who patronize the railroad (and this includes in this age almost everybody) may not be so endangered as at the present time.

To my mind many of the causes given for accidents occurring are not the main causes. Some claim wages are not sufficient to secure the best class of men, and perhaps in some cases this may be true, but I think we need to go farther back of many of the causes given to get at the real cause, and to my mind I believe it is the growing disregard for the sanctity of the Sabbath, for the frequent, if not the constant, violation of the IV commandment as given us by our Saviour.

Even machinery should have rest, and to it, although inanimate, occasional cessation from use is essential to getting from such machinery the very best results. The mechanical engineer well knows that iron and steel, or all metals, are weakened by constant vibration and for such rest is needed that the constant strain may relax—and for this rest, machinery lasts much longer and is much safer.

Then if rest is of benefit to inanimate forms, how much more is it essential to man. A man's brain must be clearer, his nerves steadier, he is less liable to make mistakes, better prepared to perform his duties, when he has been given nature's rest, as laid down, not by an arbitrary ruler, but by an all-wise Providence. And when we have obeyed Him, as we believe in the interposition of Providence, we can conscientiously and with confidence ask His protection when we have lived in obedience to His divine law.

I have been Inspector under the Canada Temperance Act for fourteen years, and after the experience I have had with Railway employees (as well as men occupying many other positions) and from such experience, I have learned that strong drink is directly or indirectly responsible for at least one half of the disasters that take place on railways. It may be said that employees do not drink while on duty, for the sake of argument admitting this yet how many of these employees, when off duty, instead of taking required rest, spend much time in drinking and carousing.

Is it then any wonder that they fall asleep when on duty, or make mistakes? But sir I happen to know that not a few railway employees drink when on duty—not perhaps excessively—but if five glasses of whiskey make a man drunk will not two glasses make him a little more dangerous and incapable to fill a responsible place, than if he had taken none?

I have known strong drink to be kept and sold in a railway station or at least in the same building in which the station was located, but thanks to the Canada Temperance Act, it is not so in this County, at least not so sold now, so far as I can judge.

And now sir, for the remedy to overcome or minimize railway disasters. Employ only total abstainers, place only such in every department, from the general superintendent down to the man that occupies the position of trackman. And when this has been done, other things being equal, railway corporations will learn that the losses caused by train wrecks have been largely reduced.
