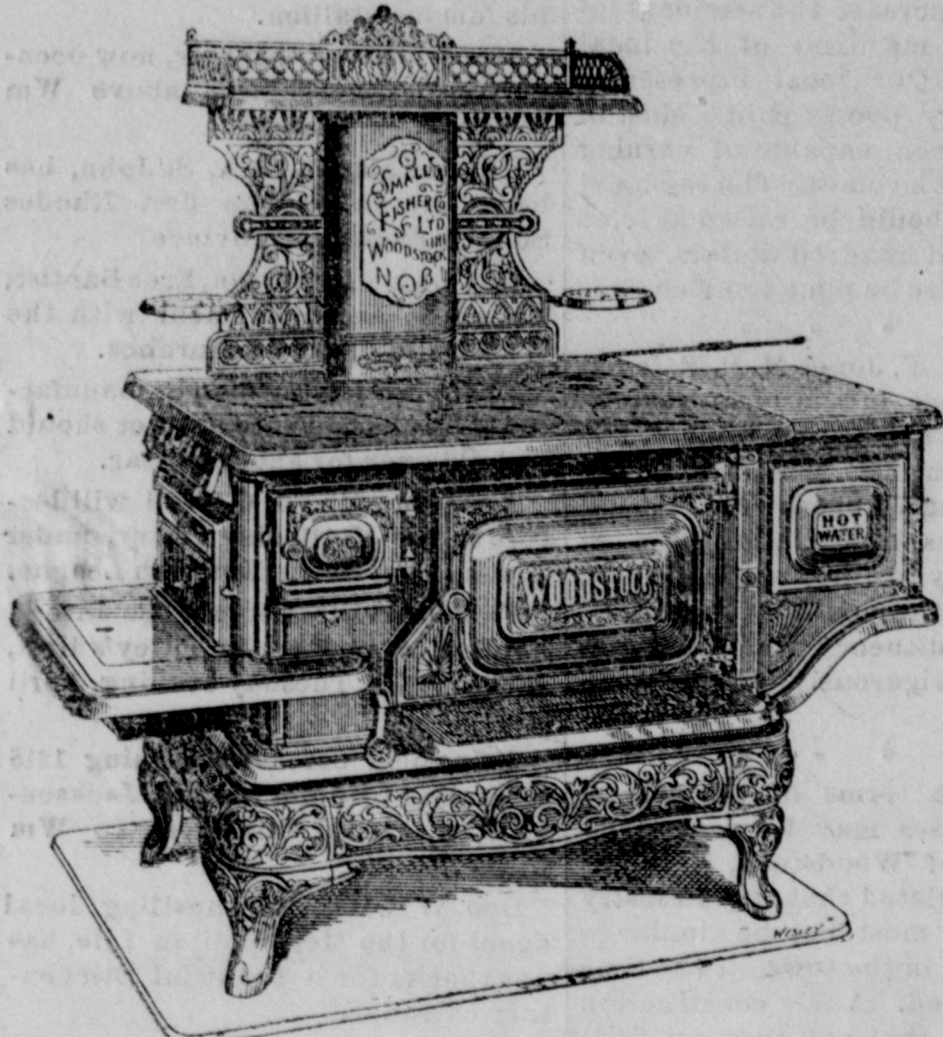

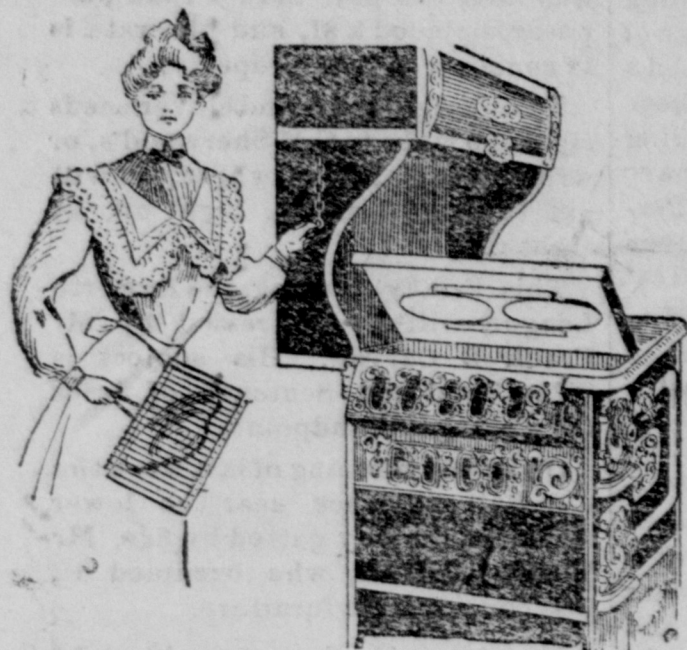

King Edward has given evidence  
of his breadth of mind in religious  
matters by building a chapel on his  
Sandringham estates in Norfolk, for

of the district, who hitherto have

field. The King's action has led to  
an outcry in the Church of England  
press, which insists that the King in  
building chapels for Methodist wor-  
ship is violating his obligations as  
head of the Church of England,  
which he has sworn to maintain. He

late Queen Victoria, when she was  
assailed by the same newspapers for  
building a Presbyterian parish  
church at Craithie, near Balmoral.
