Original Policy More than Doubled.

The Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York has recently settled policy 21,569 on the life of Thos S. Whitman of Annapolis, Nova Scotia, and the policy returned over twice its face value. The policy taken out was for \$5000, and the final settlement amounted to \$10,535.

This makes the total amount received as death claim \$10,535, the original face value of \$5000 being more than doubled although some of the dividends were used.
