New Drill Hall and Armory.

The Century Ice Rink on Chapel street, as such, has ceased to exist. The building is there just the same as ever, but on Tuesday the title to the property was vested in His Majesty King Edward VII., and it will be used in future as a drill shed and armory for the Woodstock Field Battery, Brighton Engineers and 67th Regt. Light Infantry. As soon as possible carpenters and masons will be put at work to remodel the building. The exterior will be improved in appearance by the addition of brick casings, and the interior will be fitted up in the most approved manner. Handsome quarters for the use of the officers will be established and when the building is finished it will rank second to none. There has been a great deal of disappointment among military men for a long time on account of there being no armory worthy of the name. Woodstock is an important military centre, and richly deserves the armory, which will be a source of pride to civilians as well as soldiers.

Some time ago a piece of land in another portion of town was purchased as a site for the armory, but this has been sold by the government at the same figure as they gave for it.

Young Man Leaves Town.

Fred D Anderson, for some time a member of the local staff of the Bank of Nova Scotia, left on Wednesday for his home at St. Martins. Mr. Anderson is a highly popular young man and his departure is deeply regretted. On Tuesday evening the members of the Oriole Athletic Club, of which he was a prominent member, presented Mr. Anderson with an address and a solid leather suit case which when opened was found to contain a five dollar gold piece. A feeling response was made by the recipient. The patrons of the bank presented Mr. Anderson with a highly eulogistic address expressing regret at his departure, and best wishes for his future career. The address was signed by many of the leading customers of the institution.

Arch Kirkpatrick Delights Truro Audiences.
