A WOMAN'S ORGAN.

Dear Editor in-Chief of the C. W. R. Tidings:-

About March 20th, there came to me a 'sample copy', as I then thought of The Canadian White Ribbon Tidings, which was my first intimation of the existence of an 'official organ' of our Dominion and provincial W. C. T. Unions. This copy was dated March 15th, and had been delayed en route—still was none the less welcome. To say it was speedily perused, is putting it mildly. It seemed like the return of a long, lost friend; for since the demise of the late *Woman's Journal*, there has always been a lack in getting and keeping in touch with my W. C. T. U. comrades of very many years. It certainly meets a long-felt want; and was 'glad tidings' to me that we were again going to have this want supplied.

Later, other numbers came and today I have been feasting, as I read them all from cover to cover; thus realizing the vastness of the land to be possessed, and the numbers and enmity of the foes to be overcome, ere we enter this 'Promised Land' of prohibition of the liquor-traffic and narcotics—these twin evils. Well may we exclaim, "who is sufficient for these things?" But in looking back over the years since "The Woman's Crusade,"—well can we say, "What hath God wrought?" The little cloud as big as a man's hand has grown till it covers the whole earth, which, in turn, is now girdled by the "White Ribbon."

"Yet there is much land to be possessed." Still, we have God's promise, upon which we can fully rely: "My grace is sufficient for thee"; also, "Lo I am with you always!" I can truly say I endorse every sentiment uttered in these six copies of The Tidings, more especially those relating to work among the young—particularly the boys, in relation to this "Anti-Cigarette" problem. "The Cigarette situation," as given in April 15th, and the "Ladder by which the W. C. T. U. has 'climbed'—and the 'six steps' already taken was an "eye opener" to me, though I had read elsewhere, what our women were doing in Ottawa each session. Our representatives have certainly "put themselves on record," as given in this number. I might say here, that after reading it over carefully, I wrote to our M. P. for Colchester, Mr. Gourley—and tried to impress upon him his duty both as a representative and a father at this crucial time. Both he and Mr Logan, (Cumberland), realize the danger; but, will they act in accordance?

Besides the foregoing, several sentences struck me very forcibly, and, if this standard could be reached, what an impetus would be given to the work. One especially was that of the Dominion Superintendent of S. T. I., in May 15th copy. "No teacher of youth should carry about his person the taint of alcohol or tobacco." There lies largely, the secret of the inefficiency of the work done in the schools by the male teachers who may preach but don't practice—forgetting that example is so much more powerful than precept. If all the male teachers were pledged (and it will have to come to this sooner or later) against the use and abuse of narcotics—the battle would be largely won. May their eyes soon be opened to see the evil they are doing the boys—their pupils—who are so willing to imitate them along this line of education?

Let our battle-cry be, "Save the Boys!" This was the dying charge of the convict "Buck," in the Dorchester penitentiary to Mrs Atkinson of Moncton, N. B., before his execution for murder, some few years since. "Save the boys! Save the boys!"

In saving the boys, we are also saving the girls as well. "Let us not grow weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not," or relax our efforts. I congratulate you on your grand effort to keep our W. C. T. U's again in touch from ocean to ocean, of our beloved Dominion of Canada.

Farm Laborers Excursions 1904

Latest reports show that the wheat crop of Manitoba and the Northwest is as good, if not better than past seasons, and many thousand Laborers will be required to assist in harvesting same.

The Farm Laborers excursion from the Maritime Provinces will be run on August 31st from points in Cape Breton and Nova Scotia East of New Glasgow; from all other stations in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick on Thursday, September 1st.

Second class tickets to Winnipeg will be sold from each coupon ticket station, and the rate from points in New Brunswick on Canadian Pacific lines will be \$12 going, \$18 returning; from points on the Intercolonial lines in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, also from D A R stations in Nova Scotia, rate will be \$13 going, and \$19 returning, and from coupon ticket stations in Prince Edward Island rates will be \$13.50 going, and \$19.50 returning.

These tickets will be sold to female as well as to male Laborers, but half tickets will not be issued to children and the purchaser of each ticket will be given farm laborers verification certificate, and extension coupon. On arrival at Winnipeg special trains will be met by Farmers and Manitoba Government representatives, and when extension coupon has been signed by the farmer showing that the holder thereof is engaged to work with him in the harvest fields, this coupon will be taken up by the ticket agent, and free ticket given to the Canadian Pacific station nearest to the point where the laborer has engaged to work, and on arrival at that station the laborer must deposit the verification certificate with the Canadian Pacific ticket agent. When he has worked for thirty days, and has certificate signed by the farmer, such certificate will be honored for return ticket to starting point any time prior to Nov 30th, 1904 on payment of the return rates above quoted.

It is expected special passenger trains will be run on the main lines for the accommodation of laborers, and tickets will not be good on regular passenger trains.

150 lbs. baggage wearing apparel only, will be allowed on each free ticket to Winnipeg, and every piece of baggage checked should bear the owners name and permanent address. If however anyone has made prior arrangement to work with the same farmer they were employed with in previous years, they may check their baggage through to that point, but not beyond Moosejaw, Yorkton or Estevan, as no price tickets will be furnished to points beyond those quoted.

Owing to the great difficulty in handling fifteen to twenty thousand laborers to one station at Winnipeg, baggage delivery may be slow, and as much as possible should be carried in hand grips in the cars with the passengers instead of checking.

Anyone requiring any further information should write to Mr C B Foster, District Passenger Agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway at St John, N. B. and those who intend joining excursions should notify ticket agent at once.
