A Giddy Girl Landed on a Man's Head in a St. Stephen Hotel.

ST. STEPHEN, Jan. 6.—An accident that narrowly escaped being a fatality occurred at the Windsor Hotel at an early hour this morning. A young lady named Mamie Bookbinder, employed as a table girl, has been in the habit of descending from the upper floor by throwing one foot on the stair banister and sliding down side-saddle fashion. Landlord Nicholson had frequently warned her not to try a trick so dangerous, for the stairs extend around an open well that extends from the first floor to the roof. She tried the trick again this morning and when at the third floor lost her balance and started headlong towards the bottom. Part way down she struck an iron bracket that supports a lamp, and this caused the rest of her fall to be made sideways. Fred J Boyer of Woodstock, commercial traveller, was crossing on the floor, when he was struck on the head and shoulders by the falling girl and was felled to the floor. He escaped with a bitten tongue and a broken tooth plate, though he was unconscious for a few minutes. The young lady escaped without a broken bone and apparently without injury, though she was taken to Chipman Memorial Hospital to rest for a few days.

### THE CHICAGO HORROR.

Chicago, Jan. 6.—"Make every possible effort to discover the identity of some persons who died in this corner," State Attorney Deneen has made this request of Coroner Traeger as they stood at the end of the blind gallery passage, where, before a locked exit, more than thirty victims of the Iroquois disaster were found. In this request, repeated at every point where bodies were found State Attorney Deneen gave the key to one of the gravest questions that will confront the grand jury in fixing the criminal responsibility for deaths.

It will not be sufficient for the purpose of a criminal prosecution for the coroner to show that the locked door was responsible for thirty deaths, even if the responsibility for the locked door is fixed. In order to sustain a prosecution for manslaughter it will be necessary for the coroner to determine the identity of one or more of the individuals whose death the door caused.

The bodies of 556 victims of the Iroquois theatre fire have been buried, according to burial permits issued by the health department. If the coroner's figures, which show that a total of 566 persons lost their lives in the catastrophe, be correct, only nine remain unburied. Four of these are unidentified. The records of the victims of the theatre fire, both of the police and coroner, are still incomplete and do not tally.
