TOWN COUNCIL.

On Friday evening of last week, the Town Council meeting was attended by Mayor Lindsay and a full board of councillors.

Police Magistrate Dibblee's report for nine months showed \$262 paid in fines at the police court.

Coun. Stevens reported on behalf of the committee appointed to look into the safe keeping of the books of the treasurer. He had seen Supt. Munro and found there was ample space in the town vault for all the books and papers of the treasurer.

On motion Coun. Burt, seconded Coun. Stevens, the treasurer was requested to keep his books in the town vault in future, and he be given any room now unoccupied in the town building for the use of an office, if he desires an office near the vault.

Coun. Burt reported that the town scales had been leased to George F. Smith for one year at \$75, the same price paid last year.

In reply to Coun. Jones' query if the taxes had been collected from the woollen mills, the town Marshal answered in the negative.

Coun. Stevens made inquiry if the board was satisfied with the answer of the Imperial Packing Co. made to a committee and reported upon at the preceding meeting. He had been harassed by questions from a number of citizens who think they have a grievance in the matter and the prevailing opinion is that the sawing of lumber by the company, after receiving a bonus, is not just to other concerns. He was informed by the appraisers that they took the vouchers as presented by Mr. Hay, and all the plant with the exception of the residences for the workmen, was considered in making up the \$20,000 estimate necessary for a bonus.

Before the bonus was granted a canvass was made that the industry would bring at least fifteen families into the town, from which considerable money would be received in taxes, but he was informed that only two or three people became citizens. The whole matter should be investigated.

Coun. Gallagher agreed with Coun. Stevens. It should be ascertained if the Imperial Packing Co. is under any agreement with the town for the bonus of \$5000 received by it.

The mayor suggested that a committee wait upon the town solicitor and learn particulars.

On motion Coun. Gallagher, seconded Coun. Stevens, the mayor appointed Couns. Gallagher, Fisher and Jones, to wait upon the town solicitor and find out what the agreement is if any and report at next meeting of the board.

On motion Coun. Stevens, seconded Coun. Dibblee, the mayor and clerk were instructed to issue ordinary bonds for \$2000.

On motion, Charles Greer and Augustus Finnemore, with a number of others continued from last year, were appointed field drivers and pound keepers and their barns constituted legal pounds.

On motion Coun. Jones, seconded Coun. Stevens, the street commissioner was authorized to have the town lot, at the upper end of town, graded and seeded, the total cost not to exceed \$30.

On motion Coun. Gallagher, seconded Coun. Fisher, the sewer committee was instructed to have connections made with the residences of Mrs. Stephenson and Harry Cox.

Marshal Kelly, who is also street commissioner, reported that he intended placing asphalt on 1000 yards of old work and 200 yards of new sidewalk. The repairs would cost in the vicinity of \$545. It was proposed to do some new work at the Post Office. The cost of curbing alone for the suggested new sidewalk from Connell to Chapel streets would be about \$525, at the rate of 85c. per running foot.

Moved by Coun. Jones, seconded by Coun. Gallagher, that the street commissioner build a sidewalk on Main street from town hall south as far as appropriation will permit, with granite curbing, under the direction of the street committee.

Moved by Coun. Stevens, seconded by Coun. Burt, in amendment, that the street committee place an asphalt sidewalk on the street mentioned only in front of the buildings whose owners will furnish the curbing. Amendment carried, Couns. Burt, Stevens, Fisher and Dibblee voting yea.

On motion Coun. Gallagher, seconded Coun. Stevens, the street commissioner was authorized to take up all plank sidewalk from Chapel to Connell streets.

On motion Coun. Dibblee, seconded Coun. Stevens, the street commissioner was authorized to make all necessary contracts for street work, under the direction of the street committee.

The salaries and the accumulated bills were ordered paid and the meeting adjourned.

Terrible Losses of Russians at Yalu Battle.

St. Petersburg, May 8.—The emperor has received a despatch from General Kuropatkin, giving the report of Lieut-General Zassalitch of the Russian losses in the battle of Kieu Lien Cheng. The report states that Major-General Kashtalinsky was injured in the head by a stone. The brunt of the fighting, General Zassalitch says, was borne by the 11th and 12th Rifle Regiments, and the 22nd Regiments. The losses of the two former regiments in killed were four officers, including the commander of the 11th, and 481 non-commissioned officers and men. The wounded were one officer and 801 non-commissioned men, and a chaplain, while 700 others were left on the field.

General Zassalitch confirms the reports of the enormous mortality among the artillery horses, and concludes his report as follows:—

"Our losses on April 30 and May 1 altogether amounted to seventy superior and subaltern officers and 2,324 men killed, wounded or taken prisoners. Of this total 1,081 were left on the battlefield, but it is not known whether they were killed or wounded."
