Some General Facts About Canada.

Canada is 37 years old, if dated from Confederation.

To Preserve Your Shoes.

Never try to wear a shoe too small or that does not fit when you first put it on.

There is no misery more distracting than a shoe that hurts the foot.

Never let your shoes get hard and dry. Don't let them run down.

Don't let the heels run down.

Don't dry wet shoe till you have rubbed it well with a flannel cloth and then with vaseline.

Never put shoes near the stove.

Half a peck of oats, kept in a small box, will be the very cheapest and best filling for a wet shoe. Fill the shoe and shake the oats down, after having rubbed and oiled it, and set in a dry place gradually. When dry pour the oats back for further use.

Take a wet rag and wash the shoe at least once a week, and oil overnight to keep in good condition.

Never handle patent leather until you have warmed it.

Never wear goloshes with good shoes.

Tell-Tale Finger Prints.

Albert Benham, a plumber, was charged on remand at Guildhall, London, with being in the unlawful possession of 138 ozs of silver.

This silver was partly melted and also partly broken up, its origin being difficult to trace, none of the portions being of any defined shape. Prisoner was arrested after trying to sell the silver to Messrs Bryer & Sons, Barbican, who gave information to the police.

Inspector Lyon asked that the accused might be handed over to another officer, who would arrest him on a charge of burglary. A private house in Orchard Road, Bromley, Kent, was broken into on the 26th of May, some silverware being stolen.

Finger marks were found on a plated soup tureen which was not taken. These were photographed, and had been found to be identical with the prisoner's finger prints.
