

CANADA'S STRENGTH AND WEAKNESS AS VIEWED BY AMERICANS.

Lord Dundonald, who has just been removed from the place of commanding officer of the Canadian militia because of indiscreet criticism of the government, continues his indiscretion by talking yet more vigorously. He declares that the military

forces of the Dominion lacks guns, rifles, ammunition, equipment, and all that is necessary to make a fighting force efficient, and he goes on to say: "I desire emphatically to warn the people of Canada, that though they may be indebted for the integrity of their territory and indeed their national existence to the forbearance of others, they are, as regards their preparations for war and their state of readiness to successfully resist aggression, living in a fool's paradise."

But why, indeed should Canada undertake to fortify herself for war and to resist aggression? From what point can the aggressors reach her? From nowhere except from the United States and no amount of preparation could save that country, if the United States were to reach out to take it.

The entire revenue of the Dominion of Canada would not suffice to pay the cost of maintaining a military organization sufficient, with fortified posts stretching across the continent, to beat off invaders from this side of the border.

This is the escential weakness o the Canadian situation, but the same conditions create its strength. With this great republic holding the mass of the continent no other power can reach with hostile purpose. The United States is the best fortification. In fact, we are fast assimilating Canada without conquest. The immigration of American farmers into the great wheat growing territory of the Canadian Northwest has been going on for years, and is to day a stupendous movement. The coal mines of the maritime Provinces are developed by American capital and energy. Closer trade relations with the eastern sections are demanded and soon must be granted to our merchants and manufacturers.

This is the only sort of aggression possible, and it is not of the kind Warerooms are cool and pleas- which is opposed by standing armies and bristling forts. It does not look

The Boston Post, while perhaps not voicing the entire population of United States, has we fear racked its mental organs in attempting to lay a plan of defence for little Jack Canuct, who, they think incapable of looking after himself. Let this American paper, with its wide spread circulation, know that the Canadian rooster lated. Always glad to show is fledged sufficiently well to scratch for himself, should he be forced at any time to do so. While the American rooster can crow "Yankee doodle doo," the young Canadian cockerel can ring out "Canada for me," as shrill as the pilrock of Diarmid, but there is one great difference between the two: the little Canadian cockerel does not impose upon the broods that are his junior or, when he has been forced to correct the stubborn ones, he does not pearch himself on the highest eminence and crow for glory.

This meddling with another nation's affairs is only another outbreak of the American Poke Nose Society, a repetition of their conduct during the Boer War, when they looked over and stretched their arms beyond the poor suffering wretches tory and elsewhere, and offered far better than the British soldiers discomfiture of the Americans. on the veldt.

Lord Dundonald the ex-commander of the Canadian militia probably was worked up to a fever heat on account of his dismissal. Many Canadians are not in harmony with the actions of the government in this case, as they believe the worthy earl was capable of successfully conducting the Canadian militia, but then it would have been far better for the gallant Ladysmith hero to have tendered his resignation when he saw that a collision between himself and his superior was unavoidable. Probably his prestige was lowered to a certain extent by his dismissal and he was forced to say words unbecoming of him.

Dundonald said "It may be a matter of indifference to some whether the militia of Canada lacks guns. rifles, ammunition, equipment, and all that is necessary to make a fighting force efficient". This changes the sense altogether from that published by the Post, and we would thank our American neighbors to phrases and semi-sentences from they are completed.

such important subjects as the statement of Lord Dundonald.

He did make the statement quoted by the Post warning the people of Canada (as he thought) of their unprepared state of defence, and that we owed our national existence to the forbearance of others, but why should the Post think that he had reference to the United States? What actions of theirs will go to prove that they have had forbearance in the least? No such action on their part has ever reached the eyes of Canadians and when the truth is brought out they have acted exactly opposite on all occasions when they have had to settle national questions with us. For example: when they strove for national existence and turned traitor to their king and country, they sent a message to England "complaining of the Quebec Act as a concession to the French Catholic population of Canada, whose religion they denounced in the most insulting terms". Again at the opening of the War of 1812 they called upon the God of the armies of Isræl to aid them in destroying the peaceful inhabitants of Canada. Who brought the reciprocity treaty of 1854 to a close? None other than the American Congress 'to whose forbearance we owe our national existence' to quote the Post and who, after the treaty was closed, claimed the right to fish in Canadian waters? None but these same

motherly Americans. On several occasions the United States have attempted to dictate to England as to the bounds of Canada's domains, and though they have been quite successful, yet it will be well for the Yankee to know that, notwithstanding the fact that Lords Ashburton and Alveston have given away as Canadians believe portions of territory rightfully belonging to them, as much remains yet as the whole United States, and the large province of British Columbia and half of Alberta are still untouched.

When this is known who holds the mass of the continent? If mass means extent of territory Canada leads, but if on the other hand it means rascality, murder, suicide, mob rule, lynch law and all such heathenish work then surely the United States comes off ahead and we Canadians are willing to be far in the rear.

This one has been proven to be in that class. As an example we can take the affair of May 18, 1898, in which Admiral Dewey destroyed the Spanish whaleboats and hoisted the American standard on the walls of a Pacific fortress while at the same time this nation forbade any nation of Europe to hoist its colors on any unconquered territory.

No one declares that the Canadian militia is perfect but we are not prepared to say that it is in such a deplorable state as our American neighbors would like to scatter broadcast.


