EXCURSION TO ST. ANNE DE BEAUPRE.

On Tuesday evening, June 28th, prox., will take place from the English speaking parishes of the diocese of St. John a Pilgrimage to the Shrine of St. Anne de Beaulieu, Quebec.

From the earliest days of Canadian History this shrine has been the object of public veneration, in as much as through the centuries from its establishment, it has been the theatre of manifold blessings, temporal and spiritual, to the piously inclined, who with faith in the intercession of her, who is the mother of the Blessed Virgin, have betaken themselves there for the relief of bodily or Spiritual ailments.

Apart altogether from the religious aspect of the Pilgrimage, it is a genuine treat for those desiring a little outing at small expense, for the scenery along the St. Lawrence, the route of the excursion, is simply magnificent. The historic city of Quebec in its entirety, quaint and beautiful, and Montreal, with its myriad churches and grand residences, a place never to be forgotten. Make up your minds to enjoy this outing rich and rare, which in days to come will be a pleasure for you to recall to memory.

Pilgrims should begin novena in honor of St. Anne Tuesday, June 28th. Trains will leave the following stations Tuesday evening: St. John, St. Stephen, Fredericton, Houlton, Woodstock and Bath; Stopping at intermediate points for excursionists.

At McAdam Junction all change cars and await the making up of a special train, which takes pilgrims without further change to Levis.

On arrival at Levis passengers go immediately to the steamer, which lies at adjacent wharf, and are transported direct to St. Anne's Station on the Quebec side, where the train will be waiting to take them to their destination, St. Anne de Beaulieu.

At Beaulieu the pilgrims on arrival are met by the Rev. Clergy, who conduct them processionally to the Basilica, and announce the order of the exercises.

A feature will be a grand torchlight procession in the evening in the Basilica Gardens.

Accommodations may be had at the following places: Franciscan Convent, for ladies only, \$1 per day; Lachance Hotel, \$1 per day, where two are in a room, 90 cents; Regina Hotel, \$2 per day; Other hotels, \$1 per day. No coaches required.

For convenience of excursionists a refreshment car has been secured, as pilgrims are not due at St. Anne until about 12 noon. Tea, coffee and lunch served at very reasonable charges. A small space will be reserved in the dining car for the sale of souvenirs, which may be blessed at the Shrine.

Only a limited number of sleeping berths are available and application for the same, accompanied by money remittance, should be made early, either to C. B. Foster, Esq., D. P. A., St. John, or Rev. J. J. Ryan, St. Mary's Ferry. From St. John the rate is \$2.50, and from McAdam Junction \$2.25.

Buy your tickets early and avoid the rush at stations. Tickets will be sold at all stations on the C. P. R. as far north as Aroostook Junction; they may also be had from the following gentlemen: St. John, Henry Maher, Esq.; St. Stephen, John Commis, Esq.; Fredericton, Peter Farrell, Esq.; Houlton, William Perks, Esq.; Woodstock, I. E. Sheasgreen, Esq.; Rev. J. J. Ryan, St. Mary's Ferry.

To Quebec and St. Anne's direct, return, with tickets limited to a week, \$7.50; Return via Montreal, with 10 days limit, \$10.50. It would be advisable for those intending to return via Montreal to get their tickets before leaving home, although they can on payment of \$3 at C. P. R. head office, Quebec, get a ticket for Montreal.

Return may be made by any of the regular trains morning or evening. It is expected a number of Rev. Clergy will accompany the pilgrims.

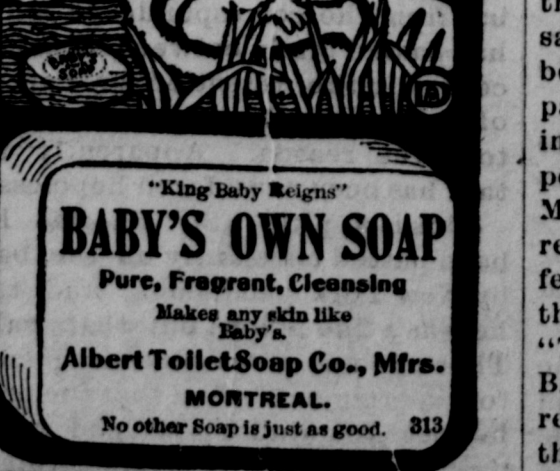
