



### THE DRINK CURSE.

The R. C. Archbishop of Westminster in a recent address said: "There is an evil in our midst which probably overshadows all the rest, and which is directly or indirectly the cause of so many of the ills which we are striving to cure. It affects the whole nation alike, and we must sadly confess that our own people, in spite of Catholic training and all the religious helps which their faith affords, are too often unable to withstand it. Were it not for this curse our position in the country would be far different from what it is. The Catholic church should be foremost in the noble attempts which the best in the nation are making to check this very tide of sin. Our religion is built on self-denial for our Master's sake; and for our own safety, and as a help to others perhaps weaker than ourselves, we should practise great restraint in this matter, and strive to establish round about us a sound public opinion, which will be a safeguard to the strong and a protection to the weak. It is therefore our duty, in so far as our opportunities permit, to take some part in the public efforts which are made to advance the cause of temperance."

This is timely teaching. Roman Catholics as well as Protestants suffer from the curse of strong drink. In many cities both in Canada and the United States liquor is very largely in the hands of Roman Catholics. This being so it is well that their religious guides should bestir themselves.—Exchange.

### ALCOHOL IN FRANCE.

We quote from the Interior: "The theory of which we used to hear so much, that the best cure for intemperance is abundance of light wines, does not appear to have proven satisfactory in France. The condition of things has reached such a pass there that the faculty of medicine in Paris threw open their doors to the late session of the National Anti-Alcohol Congress, and the conference was attended by thousands, including the president of the republic and the minister of war. Drinking has made such inroads upon the physical stamina of the French that it has become a question of improving the national morals or disbanding the army. In the last fifty years the consumption of alcohol has increased in this native country of the vine more than three times as rapidly as the population. The per capita annual use of wine throughout France is thirty eight gallons with six gallons of spirits additional. The Parisian, however, gets away with twice this amount of wine and nearly three times this amount of liquors. Not content with the 'vin ordinaire,' apples, pears and other fruits are converted into brandy by distillation, and the use of these home-made drinks is early learned by the children. In 1873 six per cent of the recruits for the army were pronounced physically unfit for service, but in 1899 this rejected portion had risen to thirty six per cent. Ex-President Casimir-Perier presided over the opening session of the congress and is one of the most active promoters of anti-alcohol legislation."

To be in earnest is a grand thing when the cause in which we are interested is good. A small band, resolute, honest, unswerving, can accomplish great things. For example, reforming bands that John Wycliffe sent out through England long before the Reformation. Witness too the lasting influence of the Scottish Covenanters and the English Puritans. Equally notable was the influence of the Anti-Slavery "fanatics" in Great Britain and the United States.

None of these people were perfect for they had all their failings. It was easy to say hard things about them. They attacked established institutions and endangered property. This is true of all reformers in all the ages. They lend themselves to ridicule, and it seems easy to lampoon them, and they are apt to injure vested interests. The gospel of Paul did much mischief to the silversmiths.

### THE NEW SENATOR.

Hon William Mitchell, the new senator for the eastern townships, was born on March 14, 1851, in the township of Durham. His father was Thomas Mitchell, who came to Canada from Ireland in 1841. The present senator began his career by embarking in the lumber business and kindred enterprises about Durham. He also engaged in railroad construction in Maine. Success attended Mr Mitchell's efforts. He removed to Drummondville in 1879. Three years previously he had married Dora A., the daughter of George H. Goddard of Danville. Having become established at Drummondville he entered into partnership under the name of Church, Mitchell & Fee. He then undertook the construction of the Drummond county railway, which he carried through to a successful issue, and which was afterwards sold to the Dominion government. He was general manager of the road before the transfer.
