## A LIBERAL VICTORY.

There was a federal by-election in Guysboro County, N. S., on Wednesday, to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of Hon. D. C. Fraser to a seat on the Supreme court bench of that province. The liberal candidate, J. H. Sinclair, was successful in the contest, and rolled up the largest majority ever recorded at a dominion election in that county. His opponent, Capt. Giffin, was a strong local man, and Mr. Sinclair an outsider, but notwithstanding this fact and the lavish use of money on the part of the opposition, a wonderful liberal victory resulted. Opposition workers from all over the Eastern provinces and Quebec, including the Editor of the *Montreal Star*, invaded the county, but their eloquence and resources were spent in vain.

## THE TRIP OF THE TROJANS.

Lovers of hockey to the number of nearly six hundred wended their way to the Century Rink Tuesday evening to see the much heralded septette from the Celestial. From the accounts that had reached these parts of the doings of these mighty puck chasers it was expected they would not only win the game but scalp at least half the opposing team. That the performance was not particularly pleasing all will admit. The visitors managed to win out by the actual score 2-1, but as they insisted upon a handicap of one goal, the official figures read 3-1.

The fun commenced with the puck almost entirely in Trojan territory. Once in awhile a long lift would relieve the tension. After about ten minutes play an offside was made by a Trojan and the whistle sounded. The Woodstock players obeyed, but another Trojan chased the puck, and McKendrick, the local goal tender knowing the play to be offside let him shoot away unmolested. Of course the puck went in the net, when nobody tried to stop it. Judge the surprise of the crowd when the Trojans actually left the ice and retired to their dressing room when the referee refused to call the play fair. Such an unsportsmanlike piece of business was never before put by any team in this town. Capt. Coleman was always considered a genuine sport previous to this trip, but his reputation here received a set back that will take years to wipe out. The manager of the rink, after consulting Capt. Connell, decided, rather than disappoint the spectators, that the baby actions of the visitors would be swallowed, and the point yielded. The game was then resumed and the only score made in the remainder of the half was on D. Connell's long lift that evaded A. Finnamore and lodged safely in the Trojans' net.

The second half was sharply contested. McManiman who played a star game throughout, was injured near the close. Two goals were scored by the visitors in this period, but the locals failed to tally. After the game all the players were given a supper at Troy's restaurant. The Trojans are first rate fellows apart from their childish and bulldozing action in leaving the ice. Woodstock people will always be glad to see any league team that will play a manly game. The unanimous verdict of disinterested parties present was that a great mistake was made in yielding to the Trojans. Two prominent Upper Province commercial men who know the game thoroughly characterized the withdrawal as simply disgusting. However, the locals are not feeling too badly over the result and will gladly face the Trojans again at the first opportunity.

## EVANGELISTIC SERVICES.
