The Kaiser and Waterloo.

The Kaiser is likely to give a new impetus to an old controversy by asserting that the Prussian troops at Waterloo saved the British army from destruction. The statement is not a new one; it is the German point of view, but none the less wrong. The more correct view is that which is held in this country that the arrival of the Prussians on the field of battle changed what might have been an indecisive conflict into one of the most thorough routs known in great struggles. The battle began about 11.30 in the forenoon. Wellington having about 62,000 men, one-third of whom were British, and Napoleon over 72,000.

The first attack on the British line, by D'Erlon's Corps, was hurled back.

Later the approach of the Prussians drew off 10,000 French troops to bar their approach. It was after this that Napoleon shattered the Prussian cavalry on the British squares in a vain attempt to break them, and as a last resort sent forward the Imperial Guard. These veterans were also driven back, and the main Prussian force then coming into the struggle, the British line followed up by the Prussians. It is, of course a question for infinite speculative discussion to determine what would have happened had the Prussians not come up; but the fact remains that Napoleon concentrated all his efforts on the British line and failed to break it.

For Chamberlain.

It is not easy to understand how Canadian stump speakers are able to assure English audiences that nine-tenths of the Canadian people are in favor of Chamberlainism. It might be fairly inferred from Mr Foster's election experience that he at all events is not in the confidence of the Canadian people. The Sun is not able to state as a fact what view nine-tenths or one-tenth of the Canadian people take of protection for England. We know that some Canadians regard the whole thing as chimerical and likely to work disaster to England, and possibly to the world at large. We are persuaded that a great many Canadians, and among these mostly the producers of food for export, would be pleased to see any preferential or other fiscal scheme worked out in England which would enhance the price of Canadian products in the English market. If it be necessary to give England something in exchange for a tariff preference, there are some who would gladly remove entirely the Canadian tariff on English manufactures, and there are many who would be willing to cut our duties on English goods to fifteen or twelve per cent. It seems plain that whatever Canada is to give must come out of the protected manufacturer. If the Canadian manufacturers are willing to bear the cost, the opponents of Chamberlainism would narrow down to those antiquated persons who believe that Chamberlainism, though profitable to Canada, for a time, could not endure and would give new strength to the prevailing prejudice that the happiness and progress of the world can only be realized by violence. What the manufacturers intend is not easy to make out without concluding that they are wanting in frankness. They have organized to secure more protection. For that purpose they have a large fund, a paper, and they are carrying on a busy agitation. They attack the Fielding preference. Sir Wilfrid Laurier held them off last session with difficulty. They shout for Chamberlainism. What do they mean? Let the Manufacturer's Association meet and by formal resolution pledge its members to a ten per cent. cut or whatever it may be in the Canadian duties on English manufactures, and the stump speakers and all of us will be greatly enlightened.—Farmer's Sun.

Domestic Hints.

Peacocks formerly took the place of turkeys on the Christmas table.

Brush your teeth inside and outside at least once a day, and rinse your mouth after each meal.

IRISH NEWS.

There is much distress in Dublin amongst the working people.

The Ulster Hall, Belfast, has been acquired by the local corporation.

Alderman Thomas Lenehan, a well known citizen of Dublin, died suddenly recently.

The Marquis of Sligo died on the 30th ult, at Westport House, Westport, County Mayo. He was born in 1824.

Bazaars are at present the method favored by Belfast of raising money for religious and philanthropic work.

Hirland & Wolf intend to build for the White Star company a steamship which will be 30 feet longer than the Baltic, the largest vessel afloat.

In Ireland there are 22 landlords who own over 50,000 acres of land apiece; and in Scotland there are 47 who possess an equally large area.

Peace reigns in Dublin. At a dinner the other day the Lord Mayor and the Lord Lieutenant met at the table for the first time for fourteen years.

The centenary commemoration of the birth of Gerald Griffin, on whose novel 'The Collegians,' the celebrated Irish drama of 'The Colleen Bawn' was founded, took place a few days ago in Cork.

A fire occurred recently at Woodside Hotel, Rostrevor, County Down, owned by the Great Northern Railway company. The flames spread rapidly, and the skating rink at the hotel became involved and much damage was done.

It is estimated that the cost to Ireland of rearing the 40,000 persons who leave the island when they are beginning to become of use to the country and themselves is between four and five million pounds, which becomes a total loss to Ireland, while resulting in great benefit to the United States.
