## THE WOOLLEN MILL CASE.

Before Judge Barker in the Equity Court at Fredericton on Tuesday, the case of the town against the Woollen Mill was heard. The town solicitor, Mr. Hartley, was present, and with him was Col. D. McLeod Vince. Mr. Carvell appeared for the Woollen Mill. We understand the lawyers for the town submitted a proposition to the court, asking leave to return the merchandise that was seized, reserving the right at a later time to move for a hearing to determine the right of the town to collect taxes from the company. We cannot see that this matter has brought any particular credit upon the town council. Already considerable expense has been incurred, and no headway has been made. Matters are exactly where they were at the start. Would it not have been far better for the town at first to have commenced operations at the point where they now propose to begin? The Woollen Mill people have from the inception of the trouble expressed a willingness to abide by the law. Had a civil suit been started by the town the question could have been threshed out in the proper manner, and we feel sure the company would not have put the town to the trouble of levying on their property had the decision gone against the Woollen Mill. As the case now appears, it would seem that the parties responsible for putting the taxpayers to unnecessary expense will have considerable to answer for. The SENTINEL believes that the law must be respected, and any person or corporation really indebted to the town should pay the bill, yet we have always advised caution in collecting where the account is in dispute. The present case is a matter for the courts to decide, since legal points are involved. That being the case the town acted unwisely in going ahead on the assumption that they had full authority and right on their side.

## OTTAWA NEWS.

Finance Minister Fielding delivered the budget on Tuesday. For the past year he was able to announce a magnificent surplus, amounting to over sixteen million dollars, breaking all previous records. The public debt was reduced seven millions, after all capital expenditure being provided for.

Mr. Fielding gave the story of the surpluses and deficits. In the eighteen years of conservative administration there was an average annual surplus of \$544,000. The average surplus since this government came to office in 1896 has been \$7,235,000. In the eight years of liberal rule there have been increases of \$14,111,296 and decreases of \$15,196,000 to the public debt of Canada, so that the affairs of the country, in spite of the large enterprises under way, were conducted with a net decrease in the public debt amounting in each of the last eight years to \$135,624, as against an annual increase of \$6,563,000 during the eighteen years of conservative government down to 1896. As to the debt per head of population, the finance minister estimated that on June 30, 1904, it would represent \$16.95, as against \$49.08 in 1891 and \$50 in 1896. He followed this with several tables indicative of the commercial and industrial prosperity of the Dominion. Our foreign trade, which amounted to \$217,000,000 in 1873; \$230,000,000 in 1883; \$247,000,000 in 1893; stood at \$476,000,000 in the year up to June 30 last. The immigration returns for 1903 showed arrivals of 134,370 comprising 50,000 from Britain, 45,000 from continental countries, and 46,000 from the United States. The showing of the present season would be equally encouraging.

The duty on woollen goods has been increased a little more than six per cent. Molasses is now on the free list, as well as printing presses. The duty on kerosene oil is reduced one half, being now 2½ cents per gallon. All these changes will be greatly appreciated in the country.

## New Lodge at Perth.

A lodge of the Knights of Pythias will likely be instituted next week at Perth. A petition from over fifty applicants has been forwarded to the Grand Chancellor, who is expected to go up on Tuesday next. A degree team from Ivanhoe Lodge will accompany him, and assist in giving the work of the order. Those likely to go from here include Rev G A Ross, J H Wilbur, R E Holyoke, H D Stevens, W B Nicholson, H P Baird, W P Jones, M P P, and other prominent brethren.

S. to mourn their loss.

The only child of Mr and Mrs G A Keith, Kipling, died at his father's residence on Saturday morning. For some time he had been suffering from an affection of the bones. An operation was performed, but was not sufficient to save the life of the child. The funeral services were held on Monday afternoon, in charge of Rev G A Ross. The parents are grief stricken at the loss of their boy, and in their heartbreaking affliction have the sincere sympathy of the community.
