Every one is liable to a fine of
\$20.00 who rides or drives any horse
or drives or permits to be driven any
horse or cattle, in his charge, upon any
part of any span of any bridge at a
pace faster than a walk. It shall be
the duty of every constable, policeman
or other peace officer, also every super-
visor and commissioner of highways
any person in charge of any highway
bridge, to stop and prevent the passage
of persons violating this Act, and to
seize and sell their horse, cattle or other
goods as the law directs.
